worldwide there is a generalized trend toward aged societies between 2015 and 2050 the proportion of the world s population over 60

years will nearly double from 12 to 22 as life expectancy continues to increase and natality rates lower not only the composition of countries will change but also its health landscape however an increased life expectancy does not necessarily mean a healthy life in most high income countries more than 20 of those years are lived in ill health due to chronic conditions caused by non communicable diseases which compromises functional ability and well being key components of healthy aging in this way not only people s lives but also societal structures are being affected based on the life course approach to healthy aging aging starts from conception in this regard the promotion of healthy aging requires preventive strategies that enhance capacities during growth and development maintain them for as long as possible after maturity and slow down their rate of decline moreover considering healthy aging across the lifespan entails focusing on different factors life opportunities and choices that might significantly influence health status lifestyle as well as health and social inequalities in older age and challenges the focus of most research on the topic which exclusively investigates the effect of influences operating in the later stages of life

the restructuring of the tertiary healthcare system in the last 15 years has meant a reduced length of client stay higher client acuity and fewer formal caregivers to care for the client much research has been conducted looking at informal caregivers caring for the elderly in the community however little investigation has occurred looking at the contribution they are making in the tertiary healthcare system the results showed there was increased satisfaction related to client age the major clinical category of female pregnancy and informal caregivers that were parents of the client most importantly this study also showed that formal caregivers with higher education preparation participated in independent client care for which they were held responsible and accountable the results of this study led to a

number of recommendations associated with research practice theory development and policy a descriptive cross sectional correlational design was used in order to assess the role of formal and informal caregiver in the current tertiary healthcare environment using questionnaires and observational methods specifically this study looked at what care role s informal caregiver s were assuming and how satisfied the client s and formal and informal caregiver s were with these roles the study took place in a 350 bed tertiary teaching hospital and included 265 client informal caregiver groupings and 313 formal caregivers

assistive technology has the potential to decrease caregiver burden increase the independence of elders and in turn decrease health care costs therefore educational workshops which educate formal caregivers on current at may be beneficial for caregivers elders and the health care system the purpose of this research project was to evaluate the effectiveness of a seven hour workshop intended to educate formal caregivers of elders on the proper use of current assistive devices a quasi experimental without random assignments pretest posttest control group design was used the participants for the study were recruited through a convenience sampling method eighty nine caregivers agreed to participate in the intervention group and 96 formal caregivers comprised the control group it was found that the intervention group participants significantly increased their subjective and objective knowledge and favorable attitudes towards at use in all nine outcome variables following the workshop abstract shortened by umi
