

The History Of Womens Mosques In Chinese Islam

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this is a study of chinese hui muslim women s historic and unrelenting spiritual educational political and gendered drive for an

institutional presence in islamic worship and leadership a mosque of one's own as a unique feature of chinese muslim culture the authors place the historical origin of women's segregated religious institutions in the chinese islamic diaspora's fight for survival and in their crucial contribution to the cause of ethnic religious minority identity and solidarity against the presentation of complex historical developments of women's own site of worship and learning the authors open out to contemporary problems of sexual politics within the wider society of socialist china and beyond to the history of islam in all its cultural diversity

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in this ethnographic examination of women's mosques in the maldives anthropologist jacqueline h fewkes probes how the existence of these separate buildings where women lead prayers for other women intersect with larger questions about gender space and global muslim communities bringing together ethnographic insight with historical accounts this volume develops an understanding of the particular religious and cultural trends in the maldives that have given rise to these unique socio religious institutions as fewkes considers women's spaces in the maldives as a practice apart from contemporary global islamic customs she interrogates the intersections between local national and transnational communities in the development of islamic spaces linking together the role of

nations in the formation of muslim social spaces with transnational conceptualizations of islamic gendered spaces using the maldivian women s mosque as a starting point this book addresses the roles of both the nation and the global muslim ummah in locating gendered spaces within discourses about gender and islam

juxtaposing muslim scholars debates over women s attendance in mosques with historical descriptions of women s activities within middle eastern and north african mosques marion holmes katz shows how over the centuries legal scholars arguments have often reacted to rather than dictated muslim women s behavior tracing sunni legal positions on women in mosques from the second century of the islamic calendar to the modern period katz connects shifts in scholarly terminology and argumentation to changing constructions of gender over time assumptions about women s changing behavior through the lifecycle gave way to a global preoccupation with sexual temptation which then became the central rationale for limits on women s mosque access at the same time travel narratives biographical dictionaries and religious polemics suggest that women s usage of mosque space often diverged in both timing and content from the ritual models constructed by scholars katz demonstrates both the concrete social and political implications of islamic legal discourse and the autonomy of women s mosque based activities she also examines women s mosque access as a trope in western travelers narratives and the evolving significance of women s mosque attendance among different islamic currents in the twentieth century

this is the first book decribes and analyzes the new phase of women s organizing in china which started in the 1980s and remains a vital force to the present day this volume enriches our understanding of the working of grassroots democracy in china by exploring women s popular organizing activities and their interaction with party state institutions by subjecting these activities to both empirical enquiry and theoretical scrutiny negotiation and transformation among and within three groups of political actors popular women s groups religious groups and the aii china women s federation is concisely presented to the reader back cover

this book presents a multi voice narrative of the history and significance of current contestations over the increasing prominence of expressive piety in hui muslim women s mosques in central china by drawing on a song book of chants collected from the tradition of women s mosques as context it reveals just how the increasing prominence of female voices has given rise to considerable misgivings among senior religious leaders over the potential destabilization of orthodox islamic gendered practices providing a

historical introduction to the place and function of islamic chants jingge and zansheng the book gives a conceptual framing of female silence sound and agency in local translations of confucian and islamic precepts and women s personal accounts of the role played by traditional and modern soundscapes in transmitting and celebrating islamic knowledge and faith as a study of women s soundscapes and the significance of legitimacy ambiguities and implications of female sound this book will be of considerable interest to students and scholars of chinese society and culture gender studies cultural anthropology and islam

discusses women in the hindu christian and muslim communities provides details of the functioning of women s movements some chapters provide background including the impact of the west on women s issues in the social reform movement of the 19th century

at a time when misogyny and hostile attitudes towards women are plaguing muslim communities throughout the world dr jasser auda presents a timely and vital challenge to the contentious issue of women s access to the mosque expounding an islamic perspective reclaiming the mosque is a crucial response to the current trials facing muslim communities and moreover it offers a clear and cohesive call to action that harks back to the islamic principles of freedom justice and human rights

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there is an ever present demand for mosques in american cities to accommodate the more than 8 percent of the american population that are muslims the majority of which are american born muslims or american converts however muslim american communities have implemented the same architectural vocabulary of mosques seen in the middle east into their american neighborhoods nevertheless this architectural transplantation from the middle east to america does not come without problems the weaving of middle eastern architectural culture with an american application of islam which is prominent within modern american society gives rise to internal tensions felt within the community in particular to the issue of muslim women s place in community mosques through the numerous case studies and investigations of the american mosques that i documented it is clear that the community does not provide adequate spaces for their women members my thesis explores the process of modifying and developing a new

architectural vocabulary for the american mosques within the confinements and boundaries in islam in particular creating an adequate space for women a lack of attention to the needs of american muslim women in the states has caused a gender conflict over the adequacy of spaces for muslim women within american mosques for example in the 2006 controversial documentary titled the mosque of morgantown 1 located in west virginia a significant dilemma was created dividing the muslim community residing in the united states the mosque of morgantown set the social precedent for some muslim women to question some of the religious rulings regarding prayers and set the tone for numerous other protests of which the most recent occurred at the islamic center of washington dc in early part of 2010 the islamic center of washington d c 2 had an outburst of escalating tensions between genders thirty washington d c women united in protest and refused to pray in the basement of the mosque which was their designated area of worship instead they decided to attend prayers under the same roof as the men during worship this seemingly simple act of protest was frowned upon the imam of the mosque declared that the allocated rows were for men only the presence of women in the rows resulted in the delay of the obligatory friday prayer that is mandatory for men in islam through these incidences it is clear that an investigation of a new architectural expression within the confinement of the religion for women driven spaces needs to be conducted

focuses on women and the civilizations and societies in which islam has played a historic role surveys all facets of life society economy politics religion the arts popular culture sports health science medicine environment and so forth of women in these societies
