engines of mischief explores the day to day labor economic political and social climate at the dawn of the industrial revolution in manchester england between 1817 and 1818 using new economic theories of the time parliamentary commissions and news reports students will engage with crucial issues of the day debating factory conditions and child labor the role of the government in the economy taxation workers unions and the extension of political rights down the social hierarchy in the game by assuming the roles of historical actors from various classes of society students are faced with choices about how to live and prosper during this period of great technological economic and social transformation will the working class violently resist new technology in factories form unions or join radical political clubs to improve their working conditions and protect their rights how best will middle class entrepreneurs run their enterprises will they provide fair treatment to their workers or simply maximize their profit how will the aristocrats maintain their power in government and society will they support the middle or the working classes

this is the first published book length treatment on paul tillich and judaism which is a neglected aspect of tillich s thought it has three compelling features first pivotal biographical details show the importance of judaism for tillich and that he ardently opposed anti semitism before wwii and after the holocaust second tillich s theological method is examined in key primary sources to show how he maintains continuity between judaism and christianity the primary source analysis includes his 1910 and 1912 dissertations on schelling the 1933 the socialist decision the 1952 berlin lectures on the jewish question and his final public lecture on the importance of the history of religion for systematic theology particular attention is paid to his dialectical and theological history of religion third tillich s positive theology of judaism contrasts sharply with the many complex negative ways in which judaism is portrayed in western thought this contributes significantly to our understanding the evolving history of christian anti judaism

leo strauss s what is political philosophy addresses almost every major theme in his life s work and is often viewed as a defense of his overall philosophic approach yet precisely because the book is so foundational if we want to understand strauss s notoriously careful and complex thinking in these essays we must also consider them just as strauss treated philosophers of the past on their own terms each of the contributors in this collection focuses on a single chapter from what is political philosophy in an effort to shed light on both strauss s thoughts about the history of philosophy and the major issues about which he wrote included are treatments of strauss s esoteric method of reading his critique of behavioral political science and his views on classical political philosophy key thinkers whose work strauss responded to are also analyzed in depth plato al farabi maimonides hobbes and locke as well as twentieth century figures such as eric voegelin alexandre kojève and kurt riezler written by scholars well known for their insight and expertise on strauss s thought the essays in this volume apply to strauss the same meticulous approach he developed in reading others the first book length treatment on a single book by strauss leo strauss s defense of the philosophic life will serve as an invaluable companion to those seeking a helpful introduction or delving deeper into the major themes and ideas of this controversial thinker

essay from the year 2019 in the subject english language and literature studies literature grade 1 0 nottingham trent university institut für anglistik und amerikanistik course culture and anarchy language english abstract in this essay i aim to compare woolf s and carter s take on the female identity as shown in their work i will focus on the novels mrs dalloway and nights at the circus respectively and their female characters the fight for female equality experienced a high during the turn of the 19th to 20th century it was defined by the suffragette movement that gained the voting right for women in 1928 however it all started in the 1890s when the term new women was introduced by the american novelists sarah grand and ouida in a pair of articles published in the north american review the writers laid focus on the independent and educated woman that was not merely an object of desire for men and a means for reproduction by the public the term was soon related to social reforms in literature however the new woman was heavily criticised she was often portrayed as selfish and over educated hence a danger to the male ego virginia woolf born in 1882 in victorian london and one of the few partially recognised female writers of her time experienced the social changes and the adoption of a new view of the woman first hand as a young woman she first came in contact with the women s rights movement in britain which later influenced her work to a great extent more recently in light of the first and second wave feminism her work has been interpreted as showing early forms of feminist thinking angela carter born more than half a century later in 1940 is known for her openly feminist writing that presents familiar stories and themes with a twist on gender and class issues6 her novels and short stories are often set in the past and explore the issues of identity for women from the light of the first and second wave feminism during the 1970s and 1980s
