term care in seven countries around the asia pacific rim the united states canada japan australia singapore hong kong and taiwan each country is covered in two chapters one to examine the philosophy and values that underlie its approaches to long term care the second to discuss its systems of service delivery these thoughtful analyses backed up with facts and figures explain program successes and failures in the context of demographic and social trends and with reference to the differing political systems across the region its breadth of perspective and insightful examination of cultural differences make long term care in the twenty first century an important contribution to the international comparative study of aging the programs in the united states australia and canada offer a fascinating contrast with the longer established and very different programs in the asian countries including japan the world s oldest country long term care in the twenty first century provides practical information on essential gerontological issues for each country including financing arrangements development of client classification systems case management in both residential and community based systems key source documents references and sites political and cultural influences home based and family caregiving this valuable book provides a critical record of developments in the current transition period this multicultural perspective contributes a chance for all countries to learn from the experience of others in dealing with a problem that is increasingly important as the world population ages long term care in the twenty first century is an essential resource for scholars service providers policymakers and anyone concerned with care of the aged not only in pacific rim countries but around the world

in the 1980s the need for long term care for elderly people in western societies was quite obvious from the increasing numbers of old and very old people in the population countries had responded in a number of different ways to cope with this need originally published in 1985 the central theme of this book is to explore these different ways and to probe beneath the surface level of institutions and specific programs beneath this level are a number of layers of care consisting of attitudes beliefs and values on a social as well as personal level thus chapters two to six explore the surface level of services goods treatments institutions etc provided in different countries for long term care chapter seven looks at another layer the role of government chapter eight at ethical issues of human rights and chapter nine at the base layer the views of elderly people themselves the book draws mainly on information from the uk usa germany and scandinavia and will be of interest to all concerned with the health and social welfare of the elderly

the number of elderly people relying on formal long term care services is dramatically increasing year after year and the challenge of ensuring the quality and financial stability of care provision is one faced by governments in both the developed and developing world this edited book is the first to provide a comprehensive international survey of long term care provision and regulation built around a series of case studies from europe north america and

asia the analytical framework allows the different approaches that countries have adopted to be compared side by side and readers are encouraged to consider which quality assurance approaches might best meet their own country s needs wider issues underpinning the need to regulate the quality of long term care are also discussed this timely book is a valuable resource for policymakers working in the health care sector researchers and students taking graduate courses on health policy and management

long term care is an increasingly important issue in many contemporary welfare states around the globe given ageing populations this ground breaking book provides detailed case studies of 11 eu member states welfare regimes within europe to show how welfare states organize structures and deliver long term care and whether there is a social investment perspective in the delivery of long term care this perspective is important because the effect of demographic transitions is often used as an argument for the existence of economic pressure on welfare states and a need for either direct retrenchment or attempts to reduce welfare state spending the book s chapters will look specifically into how different welfare states have focussed on long term care in recent years and what type of changes have taken place with regard to ageing populations and ambitions to curb increases in public sector spending in this area they describe the development in long term care for the elderly after the financial crisis and also discuss the boundaries between state and civil society in the different welfare states approaches to the delivery of care

the case studies focus on the emergence extent and nature of national policies on ageing and associated strategies to address long term care needs key opportunities for constraints on policy are identified in this first round of regional studies written by prominent researchers in hong kong korea malaysia singapore

this book uses a revised version of kingdon s multiple streams framework to examine health financing reforms in china hong kong taiwan and the republic of korea rok as well as long term care insurance ltc reforms in japan and singapore it shows that the explanatory power of the multiple streams framework can be strengthened through enriching the concepts of policy entrepreneurs ideas and windows of opportunity in the original framework as well as bringing the theoretical lens of historical institutionalism into the framework

this important book examines how nursing homes experienced the covid 19 pandemic the impacts on its residents and staff and how the industry can be reformed to better meet the demands of a similar health crisis in the future written by a gerontological nurse and director of nursing with over thirty years of experience in the long term care industry this book will interest researchers and practitioners across public health and nursing

quality of life in long term care provides long term care professionals and persons responsible for training staff at long term care facilities with guidelines for developing a quality of life that enables elderly persons even those physically or mentally challenged to achieve life satisfaction and to live with dignity readers learn of concepts and methods for implementing change through staff training a supportive management style the development of appropriate activities and the ongoing evaluation of outcomes while the focus of quality of life in long term care is on the psychosocial aspects of long term care authors dorothy coons and nancy mace also recognize and emphasize the need for excellent medical care and a therapeutic physical environment they give administrators very specific examples of ways to develop a quality of life that enables even the very impaired to live with dignity in helping long term care facility administrators and staff trainers the authors show how to support staff development so the staff becomes friends and therapists rather than simply caretakers the training methods presented provide ways to help staff better understand and empathize with elderly residents readers will find that these effective staff training and management practices help to greatly reduce staff turnover chapters in quality of life in long term care describe facilities which provide individuality opportunities for choice social stimulation and continuity of lifestyle for elderly people who live in retirement homes nursing homes or special dementia units these examples are from facilities which have brought about change despite limitations including financial problems structural restrictions and staffing problems other topics covered which help long term care facility administration and staff provide a superior quality of life for their residents include criteria for creating a health fostering and therapeutic environment in long term care settings management styles and methods that help staff achieve success specific

training topics and methods to help staff understand the needs of the elderly activities and opportunities that can enrich long term care environments an instrument designed to measure quality of life health care specialists long term care facility administrators nurses occupational activity and recreational therapists designers and developers of special dementia units policy planners in long term care and academicians in gerontology and long term care will refer to quality of life in long term care repeatedly as they strive to provide residents with a good quality of life and a nurturing environment

life expectancy is increasing in many parts of the world and more are also being enabled to live with disabling conditions that once might have been fatal people who are chronically ill have serious disabilities have hiv aids are mentally ill or victims of accidents and disasters or elderly many will need continuing care and support and these numbers will grow how best to meet these needs is getting more attention such care is not to just look after the sick but to enable those with long term illnesses or disabilities to live their lives as fully as possible institutionalization is often not the best way of care and the home where the patient lives with family members and friends nearby is often more appropriate this report examines the options highlighting the clear benefits of home based care whilst being aware of the needs of the carers in the home the report stresses it is time for health systems to take responsibility for providing caregivers in families and communities with the support they both need and to bring greater benefit to the patient

the aging of society is a growing concern in all advanced nations and at the forefront of concern is long term care for frail older people enactment of a new public long term care insurance program by the japanese government in 1997 provided an excellent opportunity for a conference focusing on an ideal long term care system for frail older people with contributions from the fields of medicine nursing social work gerontology political science economics and sociology this volume provides an overview of key problems and possible solutions in programs for frail older people from a unique international perspective

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
