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a reference book aimed at learning support co ordinators specialist and non specialist teachers and all others involved in helping students with dyslexia the book includes step by step explanation of the special needs code of practice legislation help with teaching spelling

and writing to dyslexic students advice on study skills and preparation for gcse examinations information on the provision made by examination boards for dyslexic students guidance on how technology can help the dyslexic learner and help with identifying the early warning signs of dyslexia

the first goal of this book is to describe the processing styles inherent in dyslexia and dysgraphia in sufficient detail to allow you to identify such students with a degree of confidence the second goal is to describe strategies and compensations for students who struggle with academic skills

dyslexia was first described by two english physicians kerr and morgan in 1896 interestingly the structural cortical hypothesis initially proposed by morgan is still held in wide esteem albeit in slightly modified forms despite 80 years of escalating research efforts and mounds of corresponding statistics there continues to exist a perplexing diagnostic therapeutic medical void and riddle in which dyslexics can neither be scientifically distinguished from other slow learners nor medically treated and pathognomonic clinical signs remain as elusive as a suitable neurophysiologic conceptualization this book is the outcome of a year long search for a solution to the riddle characterizing dyslexia all of my initial attempts at re exploring the safe old cortical psychogenic etc dyslexic paths and ideas led nowhere something new was needed children and adults were suffering educators and parents were bewildered answers were needed the government mandated equal education for the learning disabled clinicians were waiting and traditionalists remained fixated to the theoretical past and blind to the clinical dyslexic reality

though a good deal is known about the remediation of dyslexics of all ages there is growing awareness among teachers and others that there is much more to their work than teaching literacy skills most of us experience stress at some point in our lives but experience suggests that dyslexics are particularly vulnerable to it this book presents documented evidence on the subject the second edition has been substantially rewritten and contains contributions from both dyslexics and non dyslexics many of the contributors to the first edition have substantially rewritten their original chapters among the new contributors are morag kiziewicz herself dyslexic and a learning support manager at the university of bath michael lea a professional musician and julian cox who in the editor's view was unjustly convicted of murder by the courts when the whole event leading to this was a tragic accident brought about by his disabilities all describe the ways in which dyslexia has influenced their lives there are also chapters by lindsay peer who writes from her standpoint as education officer of the british dyslexia association and melanie jameson who is advisor to the adult dyslexia organization and speaks of the way dyslexics' stresses in the lawcourts sometimes lead to serious miscarriages of justice

researchers have devoted considerable attention to how people learn to read specifically how they recognise pronounce and understand printed words these studies are helping to illuminate not only the normal process of learning to read but also the problems that may underlie dyslexia a condition in which people are unable to acquire a high degree of reading skill despite adequate intelligence and training when reading instruction begins children as well as adult learners already possess large spoken word vocabularies their initial task is to learn how these spoken words correspond to written alphabetic symbols

impairments in this reading skill are often seen among children who have problems learning in school dyslexia is a brain based type of learning disability that specifically impairs a person's ability to read these individuals typically read at levels significantly lower than expected despite having normal intelligence although the disorder varies from person to person common characteristics among people with dyslexia are difficulty with phonological processing the manipulation of sounds and or rapid visual verbal responding

reading and writing skills were once confined to only a few people today a person facing problems with acquiring literacy skills will run the risk of being excluded from fully participating in society new information tends to imply even more demands on mastering reading and writing than ever before dyslexia was used early as a descriptive term for characterising problems of reading and writing since the introduction of the term research has made impressive progress and interdisciplinary fields have been created including social studies behavioural studies biology education and remediation above all dyslexia research has taken a step from being descriptive to suggesting theoretical models for explaining the empirical phenomena observed this book presents contributions from some of the world leading researchers on these issues in honour of one of the main scholars in the field professor ingvar lundberg

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
