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information structure and the organization of oral texts have been rarely studied crosslinguistically this book contains studies of

the grammatical organization of information in languages from different areas e.g. amazonian, finno-ugric, south asian from a variety of theoretical angles it will be a valuable resource for researchers investigating the interaction of morphosyntax and discourse in familiar and less familiar languages

jim miller and regina weinert investigate syntactic structure and the organization of discourse in spontaneous spoken language using data from english, german and russian. they develop a systematic analysis of spoken english and highlight properties that hold across languages. the authors argue that the differences in syntax and the construction of discourse between spontaneous speech and written language bear on various areas of linguistic theory apart from having obvious implications for syntactic analysis. in particular they bear on typology, chomskyan theories of first language acquisition and the perennial problem of language in education. in current typological practice written and spontaneous spoken texts are often compared. the authors show convincingly that typological research should compare like with like. the consequences for chomskyan and indeed all theories of first language acquisition flow from the central fact that children first learn spoken language before they are taught written language.

throughout history there have been efforts to help deaf children develop spoken language through which they could have full access to the hearing world. these efforts, although pursued seriously and with great care, frequently proved fruitless and often only resulted in passionate arguments over the efficacy of particular approaches. although some deaf children did develop spoken language, there was little evidence to suggest that this development had been facilitated by any particular education approach. and moreover, many even most deaf children, especially those with profound loss, never develop spoken language at all. recent technological advances, however, have led to more positive expectations for deaf children's acquisition of spoken language. innovative testing procedures for hearing allow for early identification of loss that leads to intervention services during the first weeks and months of life. programmable hearing aids allow more children to make use of residual hearing abilities. children with the most profound losses are able to reap greater benefits from cochlear implant technologies. at the same time there have been great advances in research into the processes of deaf children's language development and the outcomes they experience. as a result we are for the first time accruing a sufficient base of evidence and information to allow reliable predictions about children's progress that will in turn lead to further advances. the contributors to this volume are recognized leaders in this research and here they present the latest information on both the new world evolving for deaf and hard of hearing children and the improved expectations for their acquisition of spoken language. chapters cover topics such as the significance of early vocalizations, the uses and potential of technological advances and the cognitive processes related to

spoken language the contributors provide objective information from children in a variety of programming using signs using speech only using cued speech and cutting edge information on the language development of children using cochlear implants and the innovations in service provision along with its companion volume advances in sign language development of deaf children this book will provide a deep and broad picture of what is known about deaf children s language development in a variety of situations and contexts from this base of information progress in research and its application will accelerate and barriers to deaf children s full participation in the world around them will continue to be overcome

what is the best way to analyze spontaneous spoken language in their search for the basic units of spoken language the authors of this volume opt for a corpus driven approach they share a strong conviction that prosodic structure is essential for the study of spoken discourse and each bring their own theoretical and practical experience to the table in the first part of the

book they segment spoken material from a range of different languages russian hebrew central pomo an indigenous language from california french japanese italian and brazilian portuguese in the second part of the book each author analyzes the same two spoken english samples but looking at them from different perspectives using different methods of analysis as reflected in their respective analyses in part i this approach allows for common tendencies of segmentation to emerge both prosodic and segmental

first published in 1987 most introductory textbooks in phonetics are designed to turn the people who use them into phoneticians people who take phonetics courses on the other hand do not in general wish to become specialists but rather need to know what the study of phonetics has to offer in some other field this book is intended for those involved in any way with the study of the english language for students of linguistics or literature teachers of english and those involved with the study of literacy or the analysis of discourse or conversation
