## The Structure Of Phonological Representations Part li Part

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the present volume contains a selection of the papers and commentaries which were originally presented at the tenth conference of laboratory phonology labphon10 held in paris from june 29 to july 1 2006 the theme of the volume is variation phonetic detail and phonological representation it brings together specialists of different fields of speech research with the goal to discuss the relevance of patterns of variation and phonetic details on phonological representations and theories the topic is addressed from the angles of speech production perception acquisition speech disorders and language universals the contributions are grouped thematically in five sections each of which is commented by invited discussants section i contains the contributions to the special 10th anniversary session of the conference which represent in a prototypical way some of the different research questions that have been at the core of important debates over the last 20 years in the laboratory phonology community issues of phonological universals and language typology are addressed in section ii in section iii the notions of variation and phonetic detail are examined with regard to how they are acquired and dealt with in the formation of phonological representation in emerging systems section iv focuses on recent work at the crossroad between normal and disordered speech

rewriting rules derivations and underlying representations is an enduring characteristic of generative phonology in this book john coleman argues that this is unnecessary the expressive resources of context free unification grammars are sufficient to characterize phonological structures and alternations according to this view all phonological forms and constraints are partial descriptions of surface representations this framework now called declarative phonology is based on a detailed examination of the formalisms of feature theory syllable theory and the leading varieties of nonlinear phonology dr coleman illustrates this with two extensive analyses of the phonological structure of words in english and japanese as declarative phonology is surface based and highly restrictive it is consistent with cognitive psychology and amenable to straightforward computational implementation

the purpose of this volume is to present recent research in the field of the acquisition of functional literacy and its precursors the volume aims to capture the state of the art in this rapidly expanding field an attempt is made to clarify the vague and often inconsistent definitions of functional literacy from the perspective of development cognitive linguistic educational and social factors of literacy development are all taken into account the volume consists of three subsequent parts the first part goes into phonological precursors of literacy development in this part the focus is on the development of early language precursors of of reading and writing the cultural foundations of these precursors are explored and their links with reading development are dealt with in detail different psycholinguistic approaches are also proposed to explain the occurrence of literacy problems in the second part the scope is on the constraints of reading and writing efficiency at the word level and beyond the acquisition of reading and writing is seen as a result from the interaction between phonological orthographic and semantic processes a crosslinguistic perspective is taken on the role of writing system factors in the acquisition of literacy skills the final part deals with the role of social and educational factors in literacy acquisition starting from a

crosscultural perspective the central issue is how the attainment of functional literacy is dependent on sociocultural variation the predictors of more advanced levels of literacy development are considered including foreign language literacy and adult literacy

this book is an attempt to demonstrate that the basic principles of phonological organization boil down to the interaction between the strength of nuclei as licensers of phonological structure and various non rerankable scales of complexity occurring at different levels of phonological representation the licensing relation between nuclei and the preceding onsets on the one hand and governing relations between consonants which are to a great extent determined by their internal melodic structure allow us to view the phonological representation as a self organizing system which is able to pr

within the past forty years the field of phonology a branch of linguistics that explores both the sound structures of spoken language and the analogous phonemes of sign language as well as how these features of language are used to convey meaning has undergone several important shifts in theory that are now part of standard practice drawing together contributors from a diverse array of subfields within the discipline and honoring the pioneering work of linguist john goldsmith this book reflects on these shifting dynamics and their implications for future phonological work divided into two parts shaping phonology first explores the elaboration of abstract domains or units of analysis that fall under the purview of phonology these chapters reveal the increasing multidimensionality of phonological representation through such analytical approaches as autosegmental phonology and feature geometry the second part looks at how the advent of machine learning and computational technologies has allowed for the analysis of larger and larger phonological data sets prompting a shift from using key examples to demonstrate that a particular generalization is universal to striving for statistical generalizations across large corpora of relevant data now fundamental components of the phonologist s tool kit these two shifts have inspired a rethinking of just what it means to do linguistics

the monograph contains two case studies dealing with the phonetics and phonology of affricates and laryngeals from a survey of 281 languages the empirical findings go counter to a number of assumptions in the literature e g 1 affricates are exclusively stops from the perspective of phonology 2 laryngeals are properties of the prosodic domains onset nucleus and coda 3 phonetic strategies affrication laryngeal phasing serve to make phonological specifications acoustically more salient theoretical discussions include questions of phonological representation featural contours prosodic licensing etc and the phonology phonetics interface

this element deals with the interplay between phonology phonetics and acquisition it addresses the question of whether and how phonological representations are acquired in adult second language 12 learners in the face of phonetic variation inherent in speech drawing from a large number of empirical studies on the acquisition of 12 speech sounds the element outlines how phonetic or phonological representations develop in 12 learners on the basis of input in immersion and instructed language learning contexts taking in insights from sociophonetics and clinical linguistics the element further discusses how accent variation impacts second language phonological acquisition and what clinical studies on individuals with atypical language development can tell us about the nature of

phonological representations finally new avenues in the field of l2 phonology are explored especially with regard to methodological challenges and opportunities related to the use of spontaneous speech and remote data collection

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
