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this book bridges a gap between discussions about truth human understanding and epistemology in philosophical circles and debates about objectivity bias and truth in journalism it examines four major

philosophical theories in easy to understand terms while maintaining a critical insight which is fundamental to the contemporary study of journalism the book aims to move forward the discussion of truth in the news media by dissecting commonly used concepts such as bias objectivity balance fairness in a philosophically grounded way drawing on in depth interviews with journalists to explore how journalists talk about truth

this book examines journalistic strategies in terms of the appropriation of media logics in the conflict frame building process relying on three models objectivity mediatisation and news framing it interrogates the role orientations and performance of journalists who reported the conflict involving the indigenous christians and hausa fulani muslim settlers of jos a city in north central nigeria inhabited by approximately one million people the book provides empirical evidence of the strategies and the representations of ethnic and religious identities in the conflict narratives focusing on the most cited and vicious conflicts in jos which occurred in 2001 2008 and 2010 thus mediatised conflict research is revisited placing media logics at the heart of the conflict the text proposes solutions review journalism srj as a framework for conflict reporting and argues that a review process is necessary to measure impact

in a world where today s journalists need to know more than just how to write interview and research this book provides a practical how to approach for developing honing and practicing the intangible skills that are critical to strong journalism individual chapters introduce journalism s intangible concepts such as curiosity empathy implicit bias community engagement and tenacity relating them to solid journalistic practice through real world examples case studies and interviews with industry professionals help to further establish connections between concept and practice and end of chapter exercises give the reader a concrete pathway toward developing these skills the book offers an important perspective for the modern media landscape where any journalist seeking to make an impact must know how to contextualize events hold power to account and inform their community in order to contribute to a healthy democracy this is an invaluable text for courses in journalism skills at both the undergraduate and graduate level and anyone training the next generation of journalists

as the journalist walter lippmann noted nearly a century ago democracy falters if there is no steady supply of trustworthy and relevant news today s journalists are not providing it too often reporters give equal weight to facts and biased opinion stir up small controversies and substitute infotainment for real news even when they get the facts rights they often misjudge the context in which they belong information is the lifeblood of a healthy democracy public opinion and debate suffer when citizens are misinformed about current affairs as is increasingly the case though the failures of today s communication system cannot be blamed solely on the news media they are part of the problem and the best hope for something better patterson proposes knowledge based journalism as a corrective unless journalists are more deeply informed about the subjects they cover they will continue to misinterpret them and to be vulnerable to manipulation by their sources in this book

derived from a multi year initiative of the carnegie corporation and the knight foundation patterson calls for nothing less than a major overhaul of journalism practice and education the book speaks not only to journalists but to all who are concerned about the integrity of the information on which america s democracy depends

journalism in context is an accessible introduction to the theory and practice of journalism in a changing world the book looks at the way in which power flows through media organisations influencing not only what journalists choose to present to their audiences but how they present it and then in turn what their audiences do with it using examples from across the world as well as from her own research angela phillips uses them to explain complex theoretical concepts she invites readers to consider how news is influenced by the culture from which it emerges as well as the way it is paid for and how different countries have approached the problem of ensuring that democracy is served by its media rather than being undermined by it journalism has always been an early adopter of new technologies and the most recent changes are examined in the light of a history in which although platforms keep on changing journalism always survives the questions raised here are important for all students of journalism and all those who believe that journalism matters

in july 1997 twenty five of america s most influential journalists sat down to try and discover what had happened to their profession in the years between watergate and whitewater what they knew was that the public no longer trusted the press as it once had they were keenly aware of the pressures that advertisers and new technologies were putting on newsrooms around the country but more than anything they were aware that readers listeners and viewers the people who use the news were turning away from it in droves there were many reasons for the public s growing lack of trust on television there were the ads that looked like news shows and programs that presented gossip and press releases as if they were news there were the docudramas television movies that were an uneasy blend of fact and fiction and which purported to show viewers how events had really happened at newspapers and magazines celebrity was replacing news newsroom budgets were being slashed and editors were pushing journalists for more edge and attitude in place of reporting and on the radio powerful talk personalities led their listeners from sensation to sensation from fact to fantasy while deriding traditional journalism fact was blending with fiction news with entertainment

journalism with rumor calling themselves the committee of concerned journalists the twenty five determined to find how the news had found itself in this state drawn from the committee s years of intensive research dozens of surveys of readers listeners viewers editors and journalists and more than one hundred intensive interviews with journalists and editors the elements of journalism is the first book ever to spell out both for those who create and those who consume the news the principles and responsibilities of journalism written by bill kovach and tom rosenstiel two of the nation s preeminent press critics this is one of the most provocative books about the role of information in society in more than a generation and one of the most important ever written about news by offering in turn each of the principles that should govern reporting kovach and rosenstiel show how some of the most common conceptions about the press such as neutrality fairness and balance are actually modern misconceptions they also spell out how the news should be gathered written and reported even as they demonstrate why the first amendment is on the brink of becoming a commercial right rather than something any american citizen can enjoy the elements of journalism is already igniting a national dialogue on issues vital to us all this book will be the starting point for discussions by journalists and members of the public about the nature of journalism and the access that we all enjoy to information for years to come

this book offers a forum for discussion involving the reader in what becomes an active definition of literary journalism lively and readable it also concerns the very essence of literature itself showing how writers have reshaped styles to permit passages across the borders between fact and fiction in the process investigating what these borders might be and if they exist at all

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
