originally published in 2000 this was the first volume to examine adolescent romantic relationships

based on the study of a large number of young people ranging in age from eleven to seventeen relationships in adolescence originally published in 1974 proposes a new model of adolescent development described as the focal model which makes a valuable contribution to the greater understanding of adolescence for all who have contact with this age group the book contains an examination of three different approaches to adolescence an outline of the research project and a discussion of the empirical evidence concerning identity and self image heterosexual and parental relationships and large group situations comparisons are made between age levels and between boys

and girls with respect to the whole range of relationships and the evidence illustrates significant and at times dramatic differences between groups of particular importance are some of the changes which occur with age such as the degree of conflict with parents and attitudes to sexuality based on dr coleman s findings is his fresh focal model of adolescent development this model stresses the elements of growth and change in adolescence with special emphasis on the normal anxieties and conflicts that occur at different stages of the developmental period today it can be read and enjoyed in its historical context

developmental and clinical researchers have only just discovered the phenomenon of adolescent romance as a topic of serious scientific inquiry this discovery may be related to the overwhelming evidence that adult romantic relationships are failing at alarming rates dramatic increases in the rates of divorce out of wedlock childbirth and relationship violence lead to questions about the developmental precursors of romantic love and commitment what s wrong with love and can it be fixed this book brings together a diverse group of experts from various disciplines to address a serious gap in the understanding of adolescent development part i focuses on romantic relations and sexual behavior from the perspective of normative adolescent development part ii centers on high risk adolescents and part iii explores the practical implications of current theory and research for clinicians educators and health administrators together the chapters in this integrative and clinically useful book lay a foundation for understanding how adolescents successfully navigate the tumultuous waters of young love

the relationship code is the report of a longitudinal study conducted over a ten year period of the influence of family relationships and genetic factors on competence and psychopathology in adolescent development the sample for this landmark study included 720 pairs of same sex adolescent siblings including twins half siblings and genetically unrelated siblings and their parents using a clear expressive style david reiss and his

coinvestigators identify specific mechanisms that link genetic factors and the social environment in psychological development they propose a striking hypothesis family relationships are crucial to the expression of genetic influences on a broad array of complex behaviors in adolescents moreover this role of family relationships may be very specific some genetic factors are linked to mother child relationships others to father child relations some to relationship warmth while others are linked to relationship conflict or control the specificity of these links suggests that family relationships may constitute a code for translating genetic influences into the ontogeny of behaviors a code every bit as important for behavior as dna rna

although there is a sizeable literature on romantic relationships in the college years and adulthood limited research exists on romantic relationships in adolescence the extant work consists primarily of demographic studies of dating patterns and deals little with aspects such as the characteristics or development of adolescent romantic relationships particularly lacking is a theoretical framework to guide research on romantic relationships during this developmental stage this volume offers both innovative research and compelling discussions on adolescent romantic relationships this is the 78th issue of the quarterly journal new directions for child development
