this book discusses the history of music warning labels specifically the parental advisory label pal and the parents music resource center pmrc it aims to answer these questions how could the pmrc trigger a debate on music lyrics as a negative influence on children that led to the introduction of the pal in the long run what did the implementation of the pal warning mean for musicians and how had the perception of music changed so that the advisory label was deemed necessary the central thesis is that through the discourse on explicit lyrics certain music was marked as an actual threat to children and society and consequently started to be perceived as such by the way in which the discourse evolved and how other actors conducted themselves in the debates this understanding of certain music was repeatedly re negotiated and connected to other current discourses such as discourses on family values sexuality youth culture generational conflicts and social problems through this the understanding of certain music as a threat to children and society was constantly renewed the book analyses the pmrc s campaign on explicit lyrics and provides insights into their strategy and success from a historical perspective

the danger of music gathers some two decades of richard taruskin s writing on the arts and politics ranging in approach from occasional pieces for major newspapers such as the new york times to full scale critical essays for leading intellectual journals hard hitting provocative and incisive these essays consider contemporary composition and performance the role of critics and historians in the life of the arts and the fraught terrain where ethics and aesthetics interact and at times conflict many of the works collected here have themselves excited wide debate including the title essay which considers the rights and obligations of artists in the aftermath of the 9 11 terrorist attacks in a series of

lively postscripts written especially for this volume taruskin america s public musicologist addresses the debates he has stirred up by insisting that art is not a utopian escape and that artists inhabit the same world as the rest of society among the book s forty two essays are two public addresses one about the prospects for classical music at the end of the second millennium c e the other a revisiting of the performance issues previously discussed in the author s text *and act* 1995 that appear in print for the first time

almost without exception studies of the avant garde take for granted the premise that the influential experimental practices associated with the avant garde began primarily as a european phenomenon that in turn spread around the world these ten original essays especially commissioned for *not the other avant garde* forge a radically new conception of the avant garde by demonstrating the many ways in which the first and second wave avant gardes were always already a transnational phenomenon an amalgam of often contradictory performance traditions and practices developed in various cultural locations around the world including africa the middle east mexico argentina india and japan essays from leading scholars and critics including marvin carlson sudipto chatterjee john conteh morgan peter eckersall harry j elam jr joachim fiebach david g goodman jean graham jones hannah higgins and adam versenyi suggest collectively that the very concept of the avant garde is possible only if conceptualized beyond the limitations of eurocentric paradigms *not the other avant garde* is groundbreaking in both avant garde studies and performance studies and will be a valuable contribution to the fields of theater studies modernist studies art history literature and music history joins the growing field of critical and transnational theories on the arts its grounding in live performance and its foregrounding of the performative human body presents a new theoretical paradigm that is pathbreaking haiping yan university of california los angeles james m harding is associate professor of english at mary washington university he is author of *adorno and*
