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what is history and why should we study it is there such a thing as historical truth is history a science one of the most accomplished historians at work today answers these and other questions in this short witty and humane book it provides a searching look at the historian's craft

the concept of history reflects on the presuppositions behind the contemporary understanding of history that often remain implicit and not spelled out it is a critique of the modern understanding of history that presents it as universal and teleological progressively moving forward to an end although few contemporary philosophers and historians maintain the view that there is strict universality and teleology in history the remnants of these positions still affect our understanding of history but if history is not universal and singular evolving toward an objective universal end it should be possible to admit of multiple histories some of which we appropriate as our own an another important aspect of this book is that if provides an account of history that is itself both historical and rooted in attempts to narrate and explain history from its inception in antiquity the book seeks to establish features or constituents of history that might be found in any historical account and might themselves be considered historical invariants in history

e h carr s what is history was originally published by macmillan in 1961 since then it has sold hundreds of thousands of copies throughout the world in this book ten internationally renowned scholars writing from a range of historical vantage points answer carr s question for a new generation of historians what does it mean to study history at the start of the twenty first century this volume stands alongside carr s classic paying tribute to his seminal enquiry while moving the debate into new territory to ensure its freshness and relevance for a new century of historical study

this book explains some of the psychological processes that go into narrative construction and why it is that we have so much variability of historical accounts about a single historical event a central focus of this book is how historians go from having unconnected units of data to having a coherent structured and organized flow of experiences the author argues that the way these connections are established responds to certain gestalt psychological principles that allow us to understand not only how histories are constructed but also how this construction can be rather different depending on how these principles are applied to illustrate how these principles are present in histories the author analyzes classic historical writers such as burckhardt huizinga vico and marx as well as an explanation of why historical multiplicity happens the book also offers a way to evaluate different historical narratives about the same historical event to illustrate how the evaluative framework is at play the author analyzes two views about the so called discovery of america the first one explains what happens in 1492 by using the term discovery the second one uses the notion of invention to talk about the same set of circumstances the book provides an important epistemic tool to evaluate these different accounts one that can be applied not only to this case but also others this book appeals to scholars graduate students and upper level undergraduate students of history and philosophy in addition the book may also attract intellectuals generally considered who are interested in how philosophy can inform and question historical practice

there exists a very rich but largely untapped well of african american philosophical thought in which many black thinkers were debating the role philosophy played in racial advancement among themselves one such work that demonstrates this vibrant tradition is william h ferris s the african abroad or his evolution in western civilization tracing his development under caucasian milieu in 1913 ferris composed and published one of the most authoritative encyclopedias of black african american thought and black civilization the african abroad was well known and widely engaged with in black debates about philosophy politics and history through the mid 1900 s yet has largely disappeared from contemporary scholarship the text itself offers readers the first evidence of a black idealist philosophy of history that seeks to explain the evolution of the negro race the world over the african abroad establishes a system of thought starting from god the revelation of knowledge god offers humanity through history and finally the negro problem ferris offers the world a black philosophical perspective currently unavailable in any collection of black authors he is a racial idealist who offers systematic thinking about the world faced by the negro in the first decade of the 20th century this edition includes ferris s philosophical treatises from sections i iii from the african abroad tommy j curry includes two comprehensive introductory essays highlighting the significance of ferris s text in the study of african american philosophy and the possible contributions ferris s thoughts on ethnological thought the philosophy of history and the role of race play in the larger field of american philosophy

canadian history these sometimes startling conversations take the reader behind the scenes of the novels and into the minds of their authors through them we explore the writers motives for writing the challenges they faced in gathering information and presenting it in fictional form the sometimes hostile reaction they faced after publication and perhaps most interestingly the stories that didn't make it into their novels speaking in the past tense provides fascinating insights into the construction of national historical narratives and myths both those familiar to us and those that are still being written

not only one of our most distinguished historians but also one of the most valuable contributors to historical theory spectator in formulating an answer to the question of what is history carr argues that the facts of history are simply those which historians have chosen to focus on all historical facts come to us as a result of interpretive choices by historians influenced by the standards of their age now for the first time in penguin modern classics with an introduction by richard j evans author of the third reich trilogy
