essay from the year 2024 in the subject theology biblical theology grade 1 4 nations university nations university course new testament interpretation language english abstract the last book of the bible the apocalypse or revelation to john is one of the most difficult to interpret because it is dense with foreign and elaborate symbolism which appears odd to the modern reader symbolic language on the other hand is a key feature of apocalyptic literature of which this work is an exemplary example from around 200 b c to a d 200 such writing was extremely popular in both jewish and christian society this book offers a narrative of visions in symbolic and allegorical language derived heavily from the old testament particularly ezekiel zechariah and daniel it is unclear whether these visions were genuine experiences of the author or merely literary conventions adopted by him

since its inception the story of the apocalypse has been used as a means by which to understand the world and one s place in it the appeal of the apocalyptic myth is largely rooted in its ability to make sense of instances of crisis by incorporating those crises into a larger plan for history and an end of time that god has planned apocalypse is both an organizing principle to be imposed on an overwhelming seemingly disordered universe and a fundamentally moral story which offers hope of a new world where good and evil can be clearly delineated and addressed but all of the traditional functions and comforts of the apocalyptic myth are challenged when the myth collides with postmodernism the characteristics that define a work as postmodern ultimately destabilize the traits that make the apocalyptic myth unique using the work of terry gilliam don delillo kurt vonnegut and other writers in the genre apocalyptic transformation examines the collision of the postmodern mode and the

apocalyptic myth explores the process of secularizing this religious story and the reasons for doing so and asks the question what happens when an author undermines the grand narrative of the apocalypse

this book with roots in a conference held in iceland in may 2008 contains a series of articles reflecting modern approaches to the text context and performance of the old norse poem voluspa perhaps the best known and most discussed of all the eddic poems rather than attempting to cover eddic or skaldic poetry as a genre the main aim of this book is to present an overview of the state of the art with regard to one particular eddic poem it focuses especially on the poem s possible context within the apocalyptic tradition of northern europe in the early medieval period the approaches of the articles range from placing the poem within the pre christian oral tradition to placing it within the written and liturgical context of christianity two other chapters offer a possible context for the poem by examining the nature and background of the early medieval image of the apocalypse known to have been on display in the cathedral of holar in northern iceland while the approaches are focused on one specific poem they are nonetheless applicable to many other eddic works

biblical apocalyptic texts that make imminent predictions of the end of the world as we know it have fascinated christians from the earliest times understandably over the centuries such texts have been interpreted in a variety of different even opposing ways this is particularly so in twentieth century biblical exegesis many authors would

hold that apocalyptic texts far from truly predicting the end of time final resurrection universal judgement and perpetual separation of just and wicked are to be seen as merely existential or performative expressions of the sinner's radical dependence on a sovereign divinity any kind of literal interpretation of apocalyptic predictions therefore would seem to involve insoluble problems of a scientific ethical and social kind that modern society cannot envisage in this extensive biblical study prof o callaghan considers in detail not only the eschatology present in apocalyptic works in general and the complex debate on new testament eschatology that flourished throughout the last century he has also shown that the powerful apocalyptic message present in the new testament is essentially an application and direct consequence of jesus christ's saving work among humans principally on the basis of a narrative analysis of matthew's christology apocalyptic motifs abound in the first gospel he shows that new testament apocalyptic as it stands while radical challenging and theologically stimulating is neither irrational nor ethically untenable and this for the simple reason that the judge who will come at the end of time to save the just and condemn sinners is one and the same jesus of nazareth who has already offered the gift of salvation to the whole of humankind
