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extremely distant and distinct indigenous communities have over recent decades become more like themselves and more like each other a paradox prevalent globally but inadequately explained by established analytical frames particularly with regard to religion addressing this rich and unfolding context the handbook of indigenous religion s engages a wide variety of locations and perspectives drawing upon the efforts of a diverse group of scholars working at the intersection of indigenous studies and religious studies this volume includes a programmatic introduction that argues for new ways of conceptualizing the field of indigenous religion s numerous case study based examples and an afterword by thomas tweed

this volume explores the manners in which indigenous peoples experiences of the law has and is being transformed from an oppressive system of denying rights to the site of contestation and articulation of claims the book provides a comprehensive survey of the experience of indigenous peoples and their changing relationship with national and international juridical frameworks the contributors all of whom are renowned

experts in the field discuss topics including legal identities and recognition sovereignty and self determination indigenous claims and international law and indigenous customary law and knowledge rather than focusing upon one regional or national grouping the book includes studies of indigenous peoples experiences of the law in latin america north america oceania africa and asia it provides an original analysis of indigenous peoples encounters with the law at both the national and international levels the breadth and scholarship of this book makes it an essential reference work for students scholars and practitioners working in the field

this handbook will be a comprehensive interdisciplinary overview of indigenous peoples rights chapters by experts in the field will examine legal philosophical sociological and political issues addressing a wide range of themes at the heart of debates on the rights of indigenous peoples the book will address not only the major questions such as who are indigenous peoples what is distinctive about their rights how are their rights constructed and protected what is the relationship between national indigenous rights regimes and international norms but also themes such as culture identity genocide globalization and development rights institutionalization and the environment

this handbook provides a comprehensive and cutting edge strengths based resource on the subject of indigenous resilience indigenous peoples demonstrate considerable resilience despite the social health economic and political disparities they experience within surrounding settler societies this book considers indigenous resilience in many forms cultural spiritual and governance traditions remain in some communities and are being revitalized in others to reclaim aspects of their cultures that have been outlawed suppressed or undermined it explores how indigenous people advocate for social justice and work to shape settler societies in ways that create a more just fair and equitable world for all human and non human beings this book is divided into five sections from the past to the future pillars of indigeneity the power in indigenous identities the natural world reframing the narrative from problem to opportunity

comprised of 25 newly commissioned chapters from indigenous scholars professionals and community members from traditions around the world this book will be a useful tool for anyone seeking a deeper understanding of manifestations of wellness and resilience this handbook will be of particular interest to all scholars students and practitioners of social work social care and human services more broadly as well as those working in sociology development studies and environmental sustainability

determination and sustainability of indigenous peoples in the arctic offering multidisciplinary insights from leading figures this handbook highlights indigenous challenges approaches and solutions to pressing issues in arctic regions such as a warming climate and the loss of biodiversity it furthers our understanding of the arctic experience by analyzing how people not only survive but thrive in the planet's harshest climate through their innovation ingenuity and agency to tackle rapidly changing environments and evolving political social economic and cultural conditions the book is structured into three distinct parts that cover key topics in recent and future research with indigenous peoples in the arctic the first part examines the diversity of indigenous peoples and their cultural expressions in the different arctic states it also focuses on the well being of indigenous peoples in the arctic regions the second part relates to the identities and livelihoods that indigenous peoples in arctic regions derive from the resources in their environments this interconnection between resources and people's identities underscores their entitlements to use their lands and resources the third and final part provides insights into the political involvement of indigenous peoples from local all the way to the international level and their right to self determination and some of the recent related topics in this field this book offers a novel contribution to arctic studies empowering indigenous research for the future and rebuilding the image of indigenous peoples as proactive participants signaling their pivotal role in the co production of knowledge it will appeal to scholars and students of law political sciences geography anthropology arctic studies and environmental studies as well as policy makers and professionals

over the course of the last twenty years native american and indigenous american literary studies has experienced a dramatic shift from a critical focus on identity and authenticity to the intellectual cultural political historical and tribal nation contexts from which these indigenous literatures emerge the oxford handbook of indigenous american literature reflects on these changes and provides a complete overview of the current state of the field the handbook's forty three essays organized into four

sections cover oral traditions poetry drama non fiction fiction and other forms of indigenous american writing from the seventeenth through the twenty first century part i attends to literary histories across a range of communities providing for example analyses of inuit chicana o anishinaabe and métis literary practices part ii draws on earlier disciplinary and historical contexts to focus on specific genres as authors discuss indigenous non fiction emergent trans indigenous autobiography mexicanoh and spanish poetry native drama in the u s and canada and even a new indigenous children s literature canon the third section delves into contemporary modes of critical inquiry to expound on politics of place comparative indigenism trans indigenism native rhetoric and the power of indigenous writing to communities of readers a final section thoroughly explores the geographical breadth and expanded definition of indigenous american through detailed accounts of literature from indian territory the red atlantic the far north yucatán amerika samoa and francophone quebec together the volume is the most comprehensive and expansive critical handbook of indigenous american literatures published to date it is the first to fully take into account the last twenty years of recovery and scholarship and the first to most significantly address the diverse range of texts secondary archives writing traditions literary histories geographic and political contexts and critical discourses in the field

this handbook provides the first comprehensive international overview of significant contemporary indigenous architecture practice and discourse showcasing established and emerging indigenous authors and practitioners from australia aotearoa new zealand the pacific islands canada usa and other countries it captures the breadth and depth of contemporary work in the field establishes the historical and present context of the work and highlights important future directions for research and practice the topics covered include indigenous placemaking identity cultural regeneration and indigenous knowledges the book brings together eminent and emerging scholars and practitioners to discuss and compare major projects and design approaches to reflect on the main issues and debates while enhancing

theoretical understandings of contemporary indigenous architecture the book is an indispensable resource for scholars students policy makers and other professionals seeking to understand the ways in which indigenous people have a built tradition or aspire to translate their cultures into the built environment it is also an essential reference for academics and practitioners working in the field of the built environment who need up to date knowledge of current practices and discourse on indigenous peoples and their architecture

this volume provides an overview of key themes in indigenous environmental knowledge iek and anchors them with brief but well grounded empirical case studies of relevance for each of these themes drawn from bioculturally diverse areas around the world it provides an incisive cutting edge overview of the conceptual and philosophical issues while providing constructive examples of how iek studies have been implemented to beneficial effect in ecological restoration stewardship and governance schemes collectively the chapters in the routledge handbook of indigenous environmental knowledge cover indigenous knowledge not only in a wide range of cultures and livelihood contexts but also in a wide range of environments including drylands savannah grassland tropical forests mountain landscapes temperate and boreal forests pacific and indian ocean islands and coastal environments the chapters discuss the complexities and nuances of indigenous cosmologies and ethno metaphysics and the treatment and incorporation of iek in local national and international environmental policies taken together the chapters in this volume make a strong case for the potential of indigenous knowledge in addressing today s local and global environmental challenges especially when approached from a perspective of appreciative inquiry using cross cultural methods and ethical collaborative approaches which limit bias and inappropriate extraction of iek the book is a guide for graduate and advanced undergraduate teaching and a key reference for academics in development studies environmental studies geography anthropology and beyond as well as anyone with an interest in indigenous environmental knowledge chapters 10 and 23 of this book are freely

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the handbook is a guide to aboriginal languages with illustrative vocabularies it is divided into two parts the first part which includes maps is a survey of the indigenous languages of nsw and the act giving information about dialects locations and resources available for language revitalisation the second part provides word lists in practical spelling for 42 distinct language varieties there is also useful information on contact languages sign languages and kinship classification as well as an appendix on placenames the handbook is a valuable reference and educational resource useful to aboriginal people who want to revitalise their language

about the natural world including a deeply theoretical chapter on rewilding europe with contributions from authors around the world this handbook gives a global platform to local voices in both developed and emerging country contexts the multidisciplinary and international routledge handbook of ecotourism will be of great interest to researchers students and practitioners working in tourism and sustainability
