the longman anthology of old english old icelandic and anglo norman literatures provides a scholarly and accessible introduction to the literature which was the inspiration for many of the heroes of modern popular culture from the lord of the rings to the chronicles of narnia and which set the foundations of the english language and its literature as we know it today edited translated and annotated by the editors of beowulf and other stories the anthology introduces readers to the rich and varied literature of britain scandinavia and france of the period in and around the viking age ranging from the old english epic beowulf through to the anglo norman texts which heralded the transition middle english thematically organised chapters present elegies eulogies laments and followed by material on the viking wars in the anglo saxon chronicle vikings gods and icelandic sagas and a final chapter on early chivalry introduces the new themes and forms which led to middle english literature including arthurian romances and chaucer s canterbury tales laying out in parallel text format selections from the most important old english old icelandic and anglo norman works this anthology presents translated and annotated texts with useful bibliographic references prefaced by a headnote providing useful background and explanation

this revised edition of a history of old english literature draws extensively on the latest scholarship to have evolved over the last decade the text incorporates additional material throughout including two new chapters on anglo saxon manuscripts and incidental and marginal texts this revised edition responds to the renewed historicism in medieval studies provides wide ranging coverage including anglo latin literature as well as non canonical writings includes new chapters on manuscripts and on marginal and incidental texts incorporates expanded coverage of legal texts and scientific and scholastic texts now treated

in separate chapters demonstrates that the field of anglo saxon studies is uniquely placed to contribute to current literary debates

the earliest english provides a student friendly introduction to old english and the earliest periods of the history of the english language as it evolved before 1215 using non technical language the book covers basic terminology the linguistic and cultural backgrounds to the emergence and development of oe and the oe vocabulary that students studying this phase of the english language need to know in eight carefully structured units the authors show how the vocabulary of old english contains many items familiar to us today how its characteristic poetic form is based on a beautiful and intricate simplicity how its patterns of word building and inflectional structure are paralleled in several present day languages and how and why the english language and its literature continued to change so that by the mid 12th century the english language looks more like the english that we are familiar with in the 21st century features of the book include the provision of accessible guides to some important problem topics of classical oe stimulating cross linguistic comparisons e g the pronoun system of oe as compared with the pronoun system of present day dutch cleverly laid out translation exercises with structural help in the form of selective glossaries careful division into eight units designed for both classroom use and self study written in a clear and accessible manner the earliest english provides a comprehensive introduction to the evolution of old english language and literature and will be an invaluable textbook for students of english language and linguistics

distinguished by a remarkable combination of erudition and lucidity aspects of old english poetic syntax provides new insight into the rules that govern syntactic relationships and indicates how these rules differ for prose and verse blockley considers the functions of four of the most common and most syntactically important words in old english as well as such features of clauses as verb initial order negative contraction and unexpressed but understood subjects picking up where bruce mitchell s classic old english syntax left off blockley shows how such common words and structures mark the relationships between phrases and clauses

pioneering examination of the old english version of bede s historia ecclesiastica and its reception in the middle ages from a theoretically informed multi disciplinary perspective

a new approach to the study of old english poetry featuring close reading of the text its form and style traditions are created and maintained by groups of people living in specific times and places they do not have a life of their own in this radical new approach to old english poetics the author argues that the apparent timelessness and stability of old english poetic convention is a striking historical phenomenon that must be accounted for not assumed and that the perceived conservatism of old english poetic conventions is the result of choice successive generations of poets deliberately maintained the traditionality of old english poetry putting it into dialogue with contemporary conditions to express critique and dissent as well as nostalgia the author makes particularuse of the rich language of treasure to be found in anglo saxon verse to historicise her argument but her argument has wide implications for how we approach the role of tradition in the poetry of earlier societies drelizabeth tyler teaches in the department of english and the centre for medieval studies university of york

this review of the critical reception of old english literature from 1900 to the present moves beyond a focus on individual literary texts so as to survey the different schools methods and assumptions that have shaped the discipline examines the notable works and authors from the period including beowulf the venerable bede heroic poems and devotional literature reinforces key perspectives with excerpts from ten critical studies addresses questions of medieval literacy textuality and orality as well as style gender genre and theme embraces the interdisciplinary nature of the field with reference to historical studies religious studies anthropology art history and more

reading the runes in old english and old norse poetry is the first book length study to compare responses to runic heritage in the literature of anglo saxon england and medieval iceland the anglo saxon runic script had already become the preserve of antiquarians at the time the majority of old english poetry was written down and the icelanders recording the mythology associated with the script were at some remove from the centres of runic practice in medieval scandinavia both literary

cultures thus inherited knowledge of the runic system and the traditions associated with it but viewed this literate past from the vantage point of a developed manuscript culture there has as yet been no comprehensive study of poetic responses to this scriptural heritage which include episodes in such canonical texts as beowulf the old english riddles and the poems of the poetic edda by analysing the inflection of the script through shared literary traditions this study enhances our understanding of the burgeoning of literary self awareness in early medieval vernacular poetry and the construction of cultural memory and furthers our understanding of the relationship between anglo saxon and norse textual cultures the introduction sets out in detail the rationale for examining runes in poetry as a literary motif and surveys the relevant critical debates the body of the volume is comprised of five linked case studies of runes in poetry viewing these representations through the paradigm of scriptural reconstruction and the validation of contemporary literary historical and religious sensibilities

the volume provides an in depth account of old english organized by linguistic level individual chapters investigate the state of the art in the linguistics of old english and explore key areas of debate such as dialectology language contact standardization and literary language the volume sets the scene with a chapter on pre old english and ends with a chapter discussing textual resources available for the study of earlier english

this companion contains original essays by scholars in britain the united states canada and the netherlands in addition to general surveys on the nature of old english poetry and its material context there are detailed discussions and interpretations of individuals poems beowulf in its germanic and christian backgrounds the wanderer and the seafarer as wisdom poetry the dream of the rood and the related religious poetry the shorter heroic poems the personal lyric biblical narrative poetry saints lives and riddles and maxims the purpose in each case is to stimulate a critical engagement by providing a literary approach and some historical context

this study constructs a reading of old english poetry which takes up issues in poststructuralist theory including intertextuality work versus text and the author the modern reader knows this literature as a discrete number of poems set up and printed in

units punctuated as modern sentences and with titles inserted by modern editors carol braun pasternack offers an alternative approach which takes into account the format of the verse as it exists in the manuscripts using the term inscribed to define texts which are situated between oral inheritance and print in a detailed examination of texts throughout the canon she explores the ways in which readers construct poems in the process of reading and in addition she extends her analysis to the question of authorship arguing that the texts do not imply an author but rather imply tradition as the source of their authority

a history of old english literature a history of old english literature has been significantly revised to provide an unequivocal response to the renewed historicism in medieval studies focusing on the production and reception of old english texts and on their relation to anglo saxon history and culture this new edition covers an exceptionally broad array of genres these range from riddles and cryptograms to allegory liturgical texts and romance as well as lyric poetry and heroic legend the authors also integrate discussions of anglo latin texts crucial to understanding the development of old english literature this second edition incorporates extensive reference to scholarship that has evolved over the past decade with new chapters on both anglo saxon manuscripts and on incidental and marginal texts there is expanded treatment throughout including increased coverage of legal texts and scientific and scholastic texts the book concludes with a retrospective outline of the reception of anglo saxon literature and culture in subsequent periods

old english is a companion to old english studies and to historical studies of early english in general it is also an introduction to indo european studies in the particular sense in which they underpin the history of english professor roger lass makes accessible in a linguistically up to date and readable form the indo european and germanic background to old english as well as what can be reconstructed about the resulting state of old english itself his book is a bridge between the more elementary old english grammars and the major philological grammars and recent interpretations of the old english data old english assumes a basic knowledge of phonetics and phonology the elements of syntactic and morphological theory and an introduction to historical linguistics an extensive glossary gives definitions of the major technical terms used
