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in 1944 members of the sonderkommando the special squads composed almost exclusively of jewish prisoners who ensured the smooth operation of the gas chambers and had firsthand knowledge of the extermination process buried on the grounds of auschwitz birkenau a series of remarkable eyewitness accounts of nazi genocide this careful and penetrating study examines anew these scrolls of auschwitz which were gradually recovered in damaged and fragmentary form in the years following the camp s

the scrolls of auschwitz provide a voice not only for the men who had to work in auschwitz birkenau but also for those who worked in other camps and locations almost none of whom survived because there were more survivors and more information on the sonderkommando of birkenau these men and their testimony have become the foundation on which the scholarship on the sonderkommando has been built therefore as the only writings by sonderkommando men known to have survived their time in the camps the scrolls lie at the center of this topic gideon greif notes that these writings allow us to contemplate the affective and moral world that the sonderkommando members inhabited under the terms of this reality though there will never be perfect clarity on the ethics and morality of what happened in the gas chambers and crematoria of auschwitz birkenau the scrolls of auschwitz compared to eyewitness testimony and coinciding with acts of resistance show most sonderkommando resisting their situations and exemplify their ability to act as witnesses to the destruction of the european jewry

This book is the first to bring together analyses of the full range of post-war testimony given by survivors of the Sonderkommando of Auschwitz-Birkenau. The Auschwitz Sonderkommando were slave labourers in the gas chambers and crematoria, forced to process and dispose of the bodies of those who were murdered. They have been central to a number of key topics in post-war debates about the Shoah: collaboration, moral compromise, and survival, resistance, representation, and the possibility of bearing witness. Their testimony, however, has mostly met with a reluctance to engage in depth with it, moving from testimonies produced within the event, the *Scrolls of Auschwitz* and the Sonderkommando photographs, to testimonies given at trials and for video archives, and to the paintings of David Olère and the film *Shoah* by Claude Lanzmann. This book demonstrates the importance of their witnessing in the post-war memory of the holocaust and provides vital new insights into the questions of representation, memory, gender, and the Shoah.

and religious faith through the artifacts found there as well as what has given each site such strong staying power over time it also highlights the technological developments in geoscience and archaeology of the last 25 years that allows us to uncover more with less time expense and labor while observing the sensitivities associated with jewish traditions digging through history again further explores just how expansive the lost atlantis civilization really is expands upon information known about the dead sea scrolls and the newly discovered caves where more scrolls will be found and uncovers new excavations of the death camp of sobibor the secrets of the warsaw ghetto and escapes from sobibor ponar and fort ix that will help set a standard for future archaeology of the holocaust richard freund and the research in digging through history are featured in the national geographic documentary atlantis rising which premiered on national geographic in 2017 and a documentary follows oscar winning executive producer james cameron and emmy winning filmmaker simcha jacobovici as they investigate the myths and realities of atlantis the chapter on the archaeology of jewish resistance during the holocaust is also a part of the new television documentary resistance they fought back set to air in 2023 digging through history is the only book that details freund s groundbreaking research on atlantis and on jewish resistance during the holocaust that is featured in the films

this book explores the confrontation of radically assimilated jews with the violent collapse of their envisioned integration into a cosmopolitan european society which culminated during the holocaust this confrontation is examined through the biography of the german speaking intellectual and prominent communist theoretician of the jewish question otto heller 1897 1945 focusing on the tension between his jewish origins and his universalistic political convictions radical assimilation in the face of the holocaust traces the development of hellers position on the jewish question in three phases how he grew up to become a typical central european non jewish jew 1897 1931 how he became exceptional in that category by focusing his intellectual work on the jewish question 1931 1939 and how he reacted to the persecution and murder of european jewry as a member of the resistance in occupied france and in auschwitz 1939 1945 breaking with the common portrayal of heller as a self hating jew tom navon argues instead that heller came to lay the foundations for the groundbreaking recognition by communists of worldwide jewish national solidarity

dystopia a natural history is the first monograph devoted to the concept of dystopia taking the term to encompass both a literary tradition of satirical works mostly on

totalitarianism as well as real despotisms and societies in a state of disastrous collapse this volume redefines the central concepts and the chronology of the genre and offers a paradigm shifting understanding of the subject part one assesses the theory and prehistory of dystopia by contrast to utopia conceived as promoting an ideal of friendship defined as enhanced sociability dystopia is defined by estrangement fear and the proliferation of enemy categories a natural history of dystopia thus concentrates upon the centrality of the passion or emotion of fear and hatred in modern despotisms the work of le bon freud and others is used to show how dystopian groups use such emotions utopia and dystopia are portrayed not as opposites but as extremes on a spectrum of sociability defined by a heightened form of group identity the prehistory of the process whereby enemies are demonised is explored from early conceptions of monstrosity through christian conceptions of the devil and witchcraft and the persecution of heresy part two surveys the major dystopian moments in twentieth century despotisms focussing in particular upon nazi germany stalinism the chinese cultural revolution and cambodia under pol pot the concentration here is upon the political religion hypothesis as a key explanation for the chief excesses of communism in particular part three examines literary dystopias it commences well before the usual starting point in the secondary literature in anti jacobin writings of the 1790s two chapters address the main twentieth century texts usually studied as representative of the genre aldous huxley s brave new world and george orwell s nineteen eighty four the remainder of the section examines the evolution of the genre in the second half of the twentieth century down to the present

discusses various aspects of the jewish holocaust from its antecedents to its post war consequences with almost 1 000 alphabetically arranged entries

in this book israeli children of holocaust survivors narrate their parents war time biographies and discuss their own childhood adolescence and adult life in relation to their parents histories

relying on concrete evidence the author analyzes the theories linking jesus to the scrolls shows how the scrolls relate to early christianity probes the relationship between the bible and the scrolls and considers the mystery of the scrolls authorship

the sonderkommando the special squad of enslaved jewish laborers who were forced to work in the gas chambers and crematoria of auschwitz birkenau comprise one of the most fascinating and troubling topics within holocaust history as eyewitnesses to and unwilling abettors of the murder of their fellow jews they are the object of fierce condemnation even today yet it was a group of these seemingly compromised men who carried out the revolt of october 7 1944 one of the most celebrated acts of holocaust resistance this interdisciplinary collection assembles careful investigations into how the sonderkommando have been represented by themselves and by others both during and after the holocaust
