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the universality of shamanistic power and practice among today's hunter gatherers along with the similarity of rock art found in varied sites around the world has led Jean Clottes and David Lewis Williams to suggest in this new book that the great art of paleolithic caves can be best understood through the lens of shamanism indeed this is not a monograph on a particular site but a general discussion of the art of painted caves and their shamanistic meaning through the authors revealing words and the abundant full color illustrations we follow shamans into their trance states and we watch as they carefully paint and engrave on rock surfaces the shapes of animals whose power they seek as we learn how drawings and rituals were likely modes of shamanistic contact we understand best the actions accomplishments and traces left behind by prehistoric shamans

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wayward shamans tells the story of an idea that humanity's first expression of art religion and creativity found form in the figure of a proto priest known as a shaman tracing this classic category of the history of anthropology back to the emergence of the term in siberia the work follows the trajectory of european knowledge about the continent's eastern frontier the ethnographic record left by german natural historians engaged in the russian colonial expansion project in the 18th century includes a range of shamanic practitioners varied by gender and age later accounts by exiled russian revolutionaries noted transgendered shamans this variation vanished however in the translation of shamanism into archaeology theory where a male sorcerer emerged as the key agent of prehistoric art more recent efforts to provide a universal shamanic explanation for rock art via south africa and neurobiology likewise gloss over historical evidence of diversity by contrast this book argues for recognizing indeterminacy in the categories we use and reopening them by recalling their complex history

this book introduces readers to the belief and symbolism present in the prehistoric art of the bering strait region for about a century the archaeology of this area has mainly focused on material economic and technological perspectives leaving studies of prehistoric spirituality religion and cosmology to be under conceptualized this text questions the nature of materiality and the relationship between it and spirituality it employs an analytical and methodological approach located within the frameworks of practice theory and animist ontologies to open up thought provoking avenues for interpretive possibility this book also provides new knowledge about the prehistoric material culture of ancient inuit people and offers an assessment of contemporary archaeological theories such as cognitive archaeology structural archaeology and shamanism theory in order to examine the reliability of these theories in the studies of prehistoric art according to the ontological trend which has constituted a powerful challenge to traditional nature culture and body mind dichotomies this book reconsiders prehistoric inuit cultures providing an analysis of therianthropic motifs on prehistoric ivories to explore potential shamanism within ontological and cosmological structures

starting with the dawn of what we would recognise as modern human thought this book journeys through 35 000 years of our human past it shows how our earliest ancestors learnt to enter trance states and the revolutionary effect this had on the way they interacted with their world moreover by marrying the very latest research with vivid first person reconstructions the book will actually take readers back in time in its pages we join stone age hunting parties steal food from desperate starving cannibals sit eye to eye with a mouldy bronze age

mummy and join the celts for a feast where you truly are what you eat the story of our past has never been told this way before and has never been brought to life with such vividness this is the past as our ancestors would have known it

the diverse papers in this volume published in honour of professor de balbin cover a wide variety of the decorated caves which traditionally defined palaeolithic art as well as the open air art of the period a subject in which he has done pioneering work at siega verde and elsewhere

prehistoric rock art is the markings paintings engravings or pecked images left on rocks or cave walls by ancient peoples in this book paul g bahn provides a richly illustrated overview of prehistoric rock art and cave art from around the world summarizing the recent advances in our understanding of this extraordinary visual record he discusses new discoveries new approaches to recording and interpretation and current problems in conservation bahn focuses in particular on current issues in the interpretation of rock art notably the shamanic interpretation that has been influential in recent years and that he refutes this book is based on the rhind lectures that the author delivered for the society of antiquaries of scotland in 2006

drawing on the most up to the minute research on prehistoric art an anthropologist presents a global survey starting with the first explosion of imagery that occurred approximately 40 000 years ago but also including the creations of essentially prehistoric peoples living as recently as the early 20th century 226 illustrations

this book emerged from two sessions of the 4th international conference of the international society for shamanic research held in france in 1997 one session was devoted to prehistory another to urban shamanisms and neo shamanisms all the papers published in the second part of this book devoted to modernizing societies were presented at the conference discussions on prehistory developed subsequently and new contributions have also been included

shamanism is a term with specific anthropological roots but which is used more generally to cover a set of interactions between a practitioner or shaman and a spiritual or religious realm beyond the reach of most members of the community it has often been considered from an anthropological viewpoint but this book gathers the most recent studies on a subject which has not been comprehensively studied by archaeologists by putting together experts from two continents who have studied the phenomenon of shamanism lands of the shamans through carefully selected case studies uses the archaeological evidence to construct the shamans worldview landscape and cosmology recent interdisciplinary studies support the idea of the existence of shamanistic representations as long ago as the middle upper palaeolithic but at the same time do not follow developments during the history of humankind as ethnographic evidence shows shamanistic activity represents a complex phenomenon that is extremely diversified its spiritual activity possessing a large variety of expressions in the material culture in other words shamanism could be defined as a series of differing spiritual world views which model the material culture and the landscape throughout the archaeological record of all prehistoric and historic periods there is a series of visual representations and objects and landscape alterations that could be ascribed to these differing world views many thought to represent shamanistic cognition and activity the shaman s landscape reveals itself to the world as one of multifaceted spiritual and material activity consequently this first book dedicated completely to the shamanistic landscape presents in fresh perspective the landscapes of the lower and upper worlds as well as their phenomenological experience case studies come from europe north america and asia
