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turkish embassy letters is a collection of correspondence written by lady mary wortley montagu during her time as the wife of the british ambassador to the

ottoman empire in the early 18th century through her vivid and engaging letters lady mary provides a fascinating glimpse into the culture customs and daily life of ottoman society particularly the lives of women her keen observations and insightful commentary offer a unique perspective on a world that was largely unknown to western readers at the time making this book a valuable historical resource and a captivating read

this is the first critical study of one of the most important women writers of the early eighteenth century lady mary wortley montagu 1689 1762 who produced a body of erudite and entertaining correspondence that spanned more than fifty years lady mary s letters illuminate the difficulties encountered by a sensitive intelligent and gifted woman writer living through an era of significant cultural change these letters display the tensions inherent in the competing demands of public and private life revealing lady mary s own discomfort about the problems of authorship and authority in an age that held publication to be an improper activity for respectable women through the discourse of supposedly private letters lady mary was able to find an avenue for her talents that brought her public stature without violating the imperatives of her position as a woman and an aristocrat cynthia lowenthal argues persuasively that lady mary s letters themselves central to the establishment of the familiar letter as an important eighteenth century genre were self consciously constructed as literary artifacts and crafted as part of a larger female epistolary tradition moreover lowenthal contends the works of lady mary are essential to the feminist recuperation of women s writing precisely because she provided an aristocratic critique a voice often ignored of the class and gender codes of her day

in 1965 when editor robert halsband published his text of the turkish embassy letters of eighteenth century traveler and writer lady mary wortley montagu his work was on par with the best critical editions for eighteenth century literary work produced at the time but even then given the completeness of the primary materials available to halsband holograph printer s copy first edition with a provenance that indicated montagu s own sanction for publication his turkish embassy letters text had a problematic set of editorial procedures that let him disregard montagu s own punctuation and substitute his own

chosen by choice magazine as an outstanding academic title until recently history writing has been understood as a male enclave from which women were restricted particularly prior to the nineteenth century the first book to look at british women writers and their contributions to historiography during the long eighteenth century british women writers and the writing of history 1670 1820 asks why rather than writing history that included their own sex some women of this period chose to write the same kind of history as men one that marginalized or excluded women altogether but as devoney looser demonstrates although british women's historically informed writings were not necessarily feminist or even female focused they were intimately involved in debates over and conversations about the genre of history looser investigates the careers of lucy hutchinson lady mary wortley montagu charlotte lennox catharine macaulay hester lynch piozzi and jane austen and shows how each of their contributions to historical discourse differed greatly as a result of political historical religious class and generic affiliations adding their contributions to accounts of early modern writing refutes the assumption that historiography was an exclusive men's club and that fiction was the only prose genre open to women

given the rise of globalization and coinciding increase in cultural clashes among diverse nations it has become eminently clear to scholars of political thought that there exists a critical gap in the knowledge of non western philosophies and how western thought has been influenced by them this gap has led to a severely diminished capacity of both state and nonstate actors to communicate effectively on a global scale the political theorists area scholars and intellectual historians gathered here by takashi shogimen and cary j nederman examine the exchange of political ideas between europe and asia from the middle ages to the early twentieth century they establish the need for comparative political thought showing that in order to fully grasp the origins and achievements of the west historians of political thought must incorporate asian political discourse and ideas into their understanding by engaging in comparative studies this volume proves the necessity of a cross disciplinary approach in guiding the study of the global history of political thought

epistolary community in print contends that the printed letter is an inherently sociable genre ideally suited to the theorisation of community in early modern england in manual prose or poetic form printed letter collections make private matters public and in so doing reveal first how tenuous is the divide between

these two realms in the early modern period and second how each collection helps to constitute particular communities of readers consequently as epistolary community details epistolary visions of community were gendered this book provides a genealogy of epistolary discourse beginning with an introductory discussion of gabriel harvey and edmund spenser s wise and wittie letters 1580 and opening into chapters on six printed letter collections generated at times of political change among the authors whose letters are examined are angel day michael drayton jacques du bosque and margaret cavendish epistolary community identifies broad patterns that were taking shape and constantly morphing in english printed letters from 1580 to 1664 and then considers how the six examples of printed letters selected for discussion manipulate this generic tradition to articulate ideas of community under specific historical and political circumstances this study makes a substantial contribution to the rapidly growing field of early modern letters and demonstrates how the field impacts our understanding of political discourses in circulation between 1580 and 1664 early modern women s writing print culture and rhetoric

culture and literature indeed intellectual life as a whole in eighteenth century britain were characterized by complex internal tensions as well as influenced by the unprecedeted atmosphere of major political cultural and social change which led to the revolutions at end of the century furthermore the diffusion of periodicals and newspapers which formed the basis of public conversation in urban coffee houses functioned as a vehicle for the dispersion of works which publicly mirrored a private society in the process of transformation the focus on this change and the circulation of new ideas on taste and polite society as well as on culture and literature can be found in the continual intertwining between the public and the private spheres of society the aim of the first part of this collection of original unpublished essays by young international scholars is to investigate the dynamics of these â oeoverlappingâ spheres through new readings of eighteenth century literary works which not only analysed the mechanisms of the private and public spheres but also highlighted some remarkable cultural features such as clothing and fashion gossip and gender issues as suggested by the title the second part of the collection will expand on the principal idea of â oointersectionsâ in eighteenth century english literature from the intersections linking the private and public spheres of british society to those between eighteenth century works within the british literary canon taking into account the influence of european thought the purpose of the second group of essays is thus that of offering fresh perspectives and a re evaluation of literary and cultural reciprocal exchanges in order to better locate or re locate canonical works and authors within the eighteenth century literary tradition

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
