examines the fascinating ties between surrealist artist ren magritte and the cinema cinemagritte ren magritte within the frame of film history theory and practice investigates the dynamic relationship between the surrealist modernist artist ren magritte 1898 1967 and the cinema a topic largely ignored in the annals of film and art criticism magritte once said that he used cinema as a trampoline for the imagination but here author lucy fischer reverses that process by using magritte s work as a stimulus for an imaginative examination of film while fischer considers direct influences of film on magritte and magritte on

film she concentrates primarily on resonances of magritte s work in international cinema both fiction and documentary mainstream and experimental these resonances exist for several reasons first magritte was a lover of cinema and created works as homages to the medium such as blue cinema 1925 which immortalized his childhood movie theater second magritte s style though dependent on bizarre juxtapositions was characterized by surface realism which ties it to the nature of the photographic and cinematic image third magritte shares with film a focus on certain significant concepts the frame voyeurism illusionism the relation between word and image the face montage variable scale and flexible point of view additionally the volume explores art documentaries concerning magritte as well as the artist s whimsical amateur home movies made with his wife georgette friends and belgian surrealist associates the monograph is richly illustrated with images of magritte s oeuvre as well as film stills from such diverse works as the eternal sunshine of the spotless mind eyes without a face american splendor the blood of a poet zorns lemma the island of dr moreau the draughtsman s contract and many more cinemagritte brings a novel and creative approach to the work of magritte and both film and art criticism students scholars and fans of art history and film will enjoy this thoughtful marriage of the two

here is a critical and historical overview of unconventional and aesthetically challenging films all of feature length the author focuses on the particular forms of contemporary avant garde films which often rely on characteristics associated with historical films of the same genre included are works by such visionary filmmakers as david lynch luis bunuel jean cocteau jean luc godard guy maddin and derek jarman the first of the two appendices contains a filmography of key avant garde feature films from haxan witchcraft through the ages 1922 to maximum shame 2010 the second appendix offers a brief list of directors who have made significant contributions to films that take alternative approaches to cinematic practice establishing new grounds for analysis and evaluation

this study explores the meaning and importance of flamenco in the works of two of the most important and influential figures in 20th century spanish culture the poet and playwright federico garcia lorca and the film maker carlos saura lorca and saura shared a fascination for flamenco as a medium for the existential ideology of the marginalized and disenfranchised and this work evaluates the development of these themes through a close contextual study of their works which are linked explicitly by saura s film adaptation of lorca s bodas de sangre and more profoundly by their use of flamenco to express ideas of sexual and political marginalization in pre and post francoist spain respectively the study demonstrates that an understanding of the symbolism visual style characters themes and performance system of flamenco is key to a greater understanding of the social sexual political and existential themes in the works of lorca and saura

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
