the whale rider by witi ihimaera was first published in 1978 the book received a huge amount of critical acclaim the book was written in the early years of the author's writing career before writing the whale rider the author had written only three other novels the author admits in the introduction to the

on the east coast of new zealand the whangara people believe their presence there dates back a thousand years or more to a single ancestor paikea who escaped death when his canoe capsized by riding to shore on the back of a whale from then on whangara chiefs always the first born always male have been considered paikea s direct descendants pai an 11 year old girl in a patriarchal new zealand tribe believes she is destined to be the new chief but her grandfather koro is bound by tradition to pick a male leader pai loves koro more than anyone in the world but she must fight him and a thousand years of tradition to fulfill her destiny

C. Sturm, Apirana Taylor, and Ngahuia Te Awekotuku. His book places the fiction by Māori writers in the context of a culture of survival and traces its textual engagement with violence between empathy and sacrifice, from the privacy of domestic violence to the public arenas of systemic violence and war. He argues that out of this confrontation with violence emerges a distinctive ethnic world view created by the construction of individual experience, the development of an ideological stance, and the expression of a spiritual orientation. Heim's analysis shows works of fiction by contemporary Māori writers as challenging explorations of the constraints placed on the literary imagination by the urgent facts of the human condition and the imperatives of culture.

Aspects of transnational and indigenous cultures addresses the issues of place and mobility, aesthetics and politics, as well as identity and community, which have emerged in the framework of global transnational American and indigenous studies. With its ten chapters, contributions from the U.S., Germany, Australia, Canada, Japan, Korea, and Taiwan, the volume conceptualizes a comparative transnational paradigm for crossing over national, regional, and international boundaries and, in so doing, to imagine a shared world of poetics and aesthetics in contemporary transnational scholarship.

Global literature and the environment analyses literatures from across the world that connect readers to the localized impacts of the climate and ecological emergencies. The book contextualizes ecological breakdown within the history of imperialist capitalism, exploring how literature helps us to imagine and create a habitable and just world for all forms of life. the long forgetting is the first book length study of new zealand s post colonial literary culture beginning with a survey of the wrenching economic social and cultural changes that have occurred since 1970 including maori protest the anti tour protests of 1981 rogeromics ruthanasia the fiscal envelope and the america s cup win it then moves back to the nineteenth century and the formation of europeans relationship with maori subsequent chapters survey recent critics work in breaking up the myth of male dominated cultural nationalism that occupied much of the mid twentieth century and returning to the years since 1970 show the rise of new writing by women gays and maori a final chapter treats the generation x phenomenon maori writers struggle with official biculturalism and the rise of a distinctive new zealand based pasifika writing
