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this collection of trial records laws treatises sermons speeches woodcuttings paintings and literary texts illustrates how contemporaries from various periods have perceived alleged witches and their activities

the witchcraft sourcebook now in its second edition is a fascinating collection of documents that illustrates the development of ideas about witchcraft from ancient times to the eighteenth century many of the sources come from the period between 1400 and 1750 when more than 100 000 people most of them women were prosecuted for witchcraft in europe and colonial america during these years the prominent stereotype of the witch as an evil magician and servant of satan emerged catholics and protestants alike feared that the devil and his human confederates were destroying christian society including trial records demonological treatises and sermons literary texts narratives of demonic possession and artistic depiction of witches the documents reveal how contemporaries from various periods have perceived alleged witches and their activities brian p levack shows how notions of witchcraft have changed over time and considers the connection between gender and witchcraft and the nature of the witch s perceived power this second edition includes an extended section on the witch trials in england scotland and new england fully revised and updated introductions to the sources to include the latest scholarship and a short bibliography at the end of each introduction to guide students in their further reading the sourcebook provides students of the history of witchcraft with a broad range of sources many of which have been translated into english for the first time with commentary and background by one of the leading scholars in the field

the concept of performativity has risen to prominence throughout the humanities the rise of financial derivatives reflects the power of the performative sign in the economic sphere as recent debates about gender identity show the concept of performativity is also profoundly influential on people s personal lives although the autonomous power of representation has been studied in disciplines ranging from economics to poetics however it has not yet been evaluated in ethical terms this book supplies that deficiency providing an ethical critique of performative representation as it is manifested in semiotics linguistics philosophy poetics theology and economics it constructs a moral criticism of the performative sign in two ways first by identifying its rise to power as a single phenomenon manifested in various different areas and second by locating efficacious representation in its historical context thus connecting it to idolatry magic usury and similar performative signs the book concludes by suggesting that earlier ethical critiques of efficacious representation might be revived in our own postmodern era

travel and bewitching magic he examines the practices of some renaissance magicians who inhaled powerful drugs to communicate with spirits and of italian folk witches such as matteuccia di francisco who used hallucinogenic drugs in her love potions and herbal preparations and finicella who used drug ointments to imagine herself transformed into a cat exploring the untold history of the witches ointment and medieval hallucinogen use hatsis reveals how the church transformed folk drug practices specifically entheogenic ones into satanic experiences

women come to the fore in witchcraft trials as accused persons or as witnesses and this book is a study of women s voices in these trials in eight countries around the north sea spanish netherlands northern germany denmark scotland england norway sweden and finland from each country three trials are chosen for close reading of courtroom discourse and the narratological approach enables various individuals to speak throughout the study a choir of 24 voices of accused women are heard which reveal valuable insight into the field of mentalities and display both the individual experience of witchcraft accusation and the development of the trial particular attention is drawn to the accused women s confessions which are interpreted as enforced narratives the analyses of individual trials are also contextualized nationally and internationally by a frame of historical elements and a systematic comparison between the countries shows strong similarities regarding the impact of specific ideas about witchcraft use of pressure and torture the turning point of the trial and the verdict and sentence this volume is an essential resource for all students and scholars interested in the history of witchcraft trials transnationality cultural exchanges and gender in early modern northern europe

far from being driven by a new strain of secular philosophy the british enlightenment is a story of transformation and reversal of the protestant tradition from within the gains of liberalism were the unintended results of the violent early reformation today those gains are increasingly under threat in part because liberals do not understand their own history they fail to grasp that liberalism is less the secular opponent of religious fundamentalism than its dissident younger sibling uncertain how to confront its older evangelical competitor

the european witch hunt seeks to explain why thousands of people mostly lower class women were deliberately tortured and killed in the name of religion and morality during three centuries of intermittent witch hunting throughout europe and north america combining perspectives from history sociology psychology and other disciplines this book provides a comprehensive account of witch hunting in early modern europe julian goodare sets out an original interpretation of witch hunting as an episode of ideologically driven persecution by the godly state in the era of the reformation and counter reformation full weight is also given to the context of village social relationships and there is a detailed analysis of gender issues witch hunting was a legal operation and the courts rationale for interrogation under torture is explained panicking local elites rather than central governments were at the forefront of witch hunting further chapters explore folk beliefs about legendary witches and intellectuals beliefs about a secret conspiracy of witches in league with the devil witch hunting eventually declined when the ideological pressure to combat the devil s allies slackened a final chapter sets witch hunting in the context of other episodes of modern persecution this book is the ideal resource for students exploring the history of witch hunting its level of detail and use of social theory also make it important for scholars and researchers

this book reconsiders the place of magic at the foundations of modernity through careful close reading of plays spell books philosophical treatises and witch trial narratives andrew moore shows us that magic was ubiquitous in early modern england rather than a decline of magic this study traces a broad cultural fascination with supernatural power in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries poets philosophers jurists and monarchs debated the reality and the morality of magic and by extension the limits of human power in this way early modern english writing about magic was closely related to the scientific and political philosophical writing from the period which was likewise reimagining humanity s relationship to nature moore reads thomas hobbes s leviathan alongside contemporary writing by the notorious witch hunters matthew hopkins and john stearne he reminds us that francis bacon s scientific works were addressed to king james i whose own dæmonologie insists on the reality of witchcraft the

fantastical science fiction of margaret cavendish he argues must be understood within a tradition that includes works like christopher marlowe's doctor faustus and the peculiar autobiography of criminal astrologer simon forman by considering these disparate works together moore reveals the centrality of magic to the early modern project
