existentialism is not merely a philosophical doctrine but a living breathing confrontation with what it means to be human it is a call to face the raw realities of existence freedom responsibility anxiety alienation and ultimately death without retreating into comforting illusions this book is born out of that call to explore unpack and wrestle with the core ideas of existentialist thought not from the distance of academic abstraction but from within the very questions that define our lives the existentialist tradition is broad diverse and sometimes internally contradictory it includes thinkers as different in style and emphasis as søren kierkegaard friedrich nietzsche jean paul sartre simone de beauvoir albert camus martin heidegger and maurice merleau ponty some rooted their reflections in theology others were staunch atheists some spoke of absurdity others of transcendence but what unites them is a shared concern the centrality of individual existence in an often indifferent or unknowable universe existentialism arose in a modern world disoriented by the collapse of traditional values the disintegration of religious authority the trauma of war and the alienation of industrial society it gave voice to a generation asking not what should i believe but how should i live and who am i when all the roles and certainties fall away these are not questions with definitive answers they are lived questions answers are provisional contingent and must be earned through experience not received by doctrine this book does not pretend to provide the final word on existentialism instead it aims to guide readers

through its major themes and figures to offer a map for navigating its often challenging terrain from kierkegaard's leap of faith and nietzsche's proclamation of the death of god to sartre's radical freedom and camus's myth of sisyphus we will examine how existentialists have approached the problem of meaning in a world where meaning is not given existentialism is sometimes caricatured as dark nihilistic or pessimistic certainly it does not flinch from despair but at its heart existentialism is profoundly liberating it tells us that though we are thrown into a world not of our choosing we are not defined by our circumstances we are free and with that freedom comes the burden and the beauty of shaping a life that is authentically our own in this sense existentialism is not a philosophy of defeat but one of courage as you read you may find that existentialism doesn't offer comfort but it does offer clarity it asks you to look honestly at yourself and your condition to resist the seductions of evasion and bad faith and to take responsibility for the shape of your life that is its enduring power and its enduring challenge whether you are encountering these ideas for the first time or returning to them with new eyes i invite you to read this book not only with the intellect but with the whole of your being existentialism is not just something to be studied it is something to be lived

jean paul sartre a towering figure in 20th century philosophy is perhaps best known for his development of existentialism a school of thought that emphasizes individual freedom choice and the creation of meaning in an otherwise indifferent universe sartre's philosophy arises from the existentialist tradition but distinguishes itself through its rigorous approach to human freedom and responsibility at the heart of sartre's thought is the idea that human beings are condemned to be free burdened with the constant task of making choices without any external justification or predetermined essence born in paris in 1905 sartre's intellectual journey was shaped by early encounters with phenomenology and existential philosophy especially through the works of edmund husserl and martin heidegger however it was his engagement with phenomenology along with his studies in literature and politics that laid the groundwork for his later ideas sartre's major philosophical work being

and nothingness 1943 is considered one of the central texts of existentialist thought where he explores the nature of existence consciousness and freedom in profound detail sartre s existentialism diverges from traditional metaphysical perspectives by rejecting the notion of an intrinsic human nature or essence for sartre existence precedes essence meaning that individuals are not born with any predefined purpose or identity instead they must create their essence through their actions and choices this concept places the responsibility for defining oneself squarely on the individual leading to sartre s famous assertion that man is nothing else but what he makes of himself

there are already many excellent books on existentialism some of them deal with particular problem or particular existentialist writers most of those that deal with existentialism as a whole divide their subject matter according to authors presenting chapters on kierkegaard heidegger sartre and the rest thus i think that there is room for the present book which attempts a comprehensive examination and evaluation of existentialism but does so by thematic treatment that is to say each chapter deals with a major theme of existentialist philosophy and these themes are arranged in the order of the existential dialect of course each chapter is illustrated with material from the writings of existentialists from kierkegaard to camus

existentialism is often studied by students with little or no background in philosophy either as an introduction to the idea of studying philosophy or as part of a literary course although it is often an attractive topic for students interested in thinking about questions of self or being it also requires them to study difficult thinkers and texts this guide for the perplexed begins with the question of what is existentialism and then moves on to provide a brief analysis of the key thinkers writers and texts both philosophical and literary central to existentialism chapters focus particularly on kierkegaard heidegger sartre and camus but also discuss other philosophers and writers such as nietzsche dostoevsky and kafka the second section of the guide introduces key topics associated with existentialist thought self consciousness the question of god and commitment each chapter explains the concepts and debates and provides guidance on reading and analysing the philosophical and literary texts addressed focusing throughout on clarifying the areas students find most difficult

existentialism is the philosophy of human existence which flourished first in germany in the 1920s and 1930s and then in france in the decade following the end of world war ii the operative meaning of existentialism here is thus broader than it was circa 1945 when the term first gained currency in france as a label for the philosophy of jean paul sartre however it is considerably less broad than the view proposed by commentators in the 1950s and 1960s who in an attempt to overcome sartre s hegemony discovered the seeds of existentialism far and wide in shakespeare saint augustine and the old testament prophets in this dictionary existentialism is understood as a decidedly 20th century phenomenon though with roots in the 19th century effort has been made to understand the philosophy of existentialism as all philosophies should be understood as part of an ongoing intellectual tradition an evolving history of problems concepts and arguments the a to z of existentialism explains the central claims of existentialist philosophy and the contexts in which it developed into one of the most influential intellectual trends of the 20th century this is done through a chronology an introductory essay a bibliography and more than 300 cross referenced dictionary entries offering clear accessible accounts of the life and thought of major existentialists like jean paul

sartre martin heidegger martin buber karl jaspers gabriel marcel simone de beauvoir albert camus and maurice merleau ponty as well as thinkers influential to its development such as wilhelm dilthey henri bergson edmund husserl and max scheler this book affords readers an integrated critical and historically sensitive understanding of this important philosophical movement

this book presents a new english translation of two seminal works by jean paul sartre the most dominant european intellectual of the post world war ii decades the volume includes sartre s 1945 lecture existentialism is a humanism and his analysis of camus s the stranger along with a discussion of these works by acclaimed sartre biographer annie cohen solal this edition is a translation of the 1996 french edition which includes arlette elkaïm sartre s introduction and a q a with sartre about his lecture in her foreword intended for an american audience acclaimed sartre biographer annie cohen solal offers an assessment of both works it was to correct common misconceptions about his thought that sartre accepted an invitation to speak on october 29 1945 at the club maintenant in paris the unstated objective of his lecture existentialism is a humanism was to expound his philosophy as a form of existentialism a term much bandied about at the time sartre asserted that existentialism was essentially a doctrine for philosophers though ironically he was about to make it accessible to a general audience the published text of his lecture quickly became one of the bibles of existentialism and made sartre an international celebrity the idea of freedom occupies the center of sartre s doctrine man born into an empty godless universe is nothing to begin with he creates his essence his self his being through the choices he freely makes existence precedes essence were it not for the contingency of his death he would never end choosing to be this or that is to affirm the value of what we choose in choosing therefore we commit not only ourselves but all of mankind
