this study provides a definition and a typology of swearing and compares its manifestations in english and 24 other languages in addition the study traces the history of swearing from its first known appearance in ancient egypt to the present day

while most of the more recent influential work on swearing has concentrated on english and other languages from the global north looking at forms and functions of swear words this contribution redirects the necessary focus onto a sociolinguistics of swearing that puts transgressive

practices in non western languages into the focus the transdisciplinary volume contains innovative case studies that address swearing and cursing in parts of the world characterized by consequences of colonialism and increasingly debated inequalities turning away from more conventional and established methodologies and theoretical approaches the book envisages to address transgressive linguistic practices performances and contexts in africa asia america and europe including individuals creativity subversive power and agency due to its interdisciplinary and non mainstream focus this volume is an essential addition to the field of studies

swearing is an everyday part of the language of most speakers of modern english this corpus informed account describes swearing and its social function with a particular focus on the relationship between swearing and abuse

linguistic taboo has been relegated for a long time to a peripheral position within linguistics due to its social stigmatization and inherent linguistic complexity recently though there has been a renewed interest in revisiting the phenomenon especially from cognitive frameworks this volume is the first collection of papers dealing with linguistic taboo from that perspective the volume gathers 15 chapters which provide novel insights into a broad range of taboo phenomena euphemism dysphemism swearing political correctness coprolalia etc from the fields of sexuality diseases death war ageing or religion with a special focus on lexical semantics the authors in the volume work within cognitive linguistics frameworks such as conceptual metaphor and metonymy cultural conceptualization or cognitive sociolinguistics but also at the interface of pragmatics discourse analysis applied linguistics cognitive science or psychiatry this volume provides theoretical reflections and case studies based on new methods and data from varied languages english spanish polish dutch persian gikъy and egyptian arabic as such it moves towards a new generation of linguistic taboo studies
