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troubling vision addresses american culture s fixation on black visibility exploring how blackness is persistently seen as a problem in public culture and even in black scholarship that challenges racist discourse through trenchant analysis nicole r fleetwood reorients the problem of black visibility by turning attention to what it means to see blackness and to the performative codes that reinforce resignify and disrupt its meaning working across visual theory and performance studies fleetwood asks how is the black body visualized as both familiar and disruptive how might we investigate the black body as a troubling presence to the scopic regimes that define it as such how is value assessed based on visible blackness fleetwood documents multiple forms of engagement with the visual even as she meticulously underscores how the terms of engagement change in various performative contexts examining a range of practices from the documentary photography of charles teenie harris to the excess flesh performances of black female artists and pop stars to the media art of fatimah tuggar to the iconicity of michael jackson fleetwood reveals and reconfigures the mechanics codes and metaphors of blackness in visual culture troubling vision is a path breaking book that examines the problem of seeing blackness the simultaneous hyper visibility and invisibility of african americans in us visual culture in the last half century weaving together critical modes and methodologies from performance studies art history critical race studies visual culture analysis and gender theory fleetwood expands du bois s idea of double vision into a broad questioning of whether representation itself will resolve the problem of the black body in the field of vision with skilled attention to historical contexts documentary practices and media forms she takes up the works of a broad variety of cultural producers from photographers and playwrights to musicians and visual artists and examines black spectatorship as well as black spectacle in chapters on the trope of non iconicity in the photographs of charles teenie harris the visible seams in the digital images of the artist fatimah tuggar and a coda on the un dead michael jackson fleetwood s close analyses soar troubling vision is a beautifully written original and important addition to the field of american studies announcement of the american studies association for the 2012 lora romero first book publication prize

nicole r fleetwood explores how blackness is seen as a troubling presence in the field of vision and the black body is persistently seen as a problem she examines a wide range of materials from visual and media art documentary photography theatre performance and more

blackness has always played a central role in the american imagination therefore it should not be surprising that popular television a medium that grew up with the civil rights movement has featured blackness as both a foil and a key narrative theme throughout its sixty year existence ironically in modern colorblind times we are faced with a unique turn of events blackness is actually over represented in television sitcoms and dramas channeling blackness studies on television and race in america presents fifteen classic and contemporary studies of the shifting complex relationship between popular television and blackness using a variety of methodological and theoretical approaches these essays examine four key issues that have framed popular and scholarly inquiries into the nature of race on television the black white binary the power of media distinguishing between negative and positive images the relative importance of markets versus racial motives in television firmly establishing popular television as a central cultural forum in our society channeling blackness looks at how television has profoundly shaped and been shaped by america s ambivalent relationship with blackness it provides numerous examples of how our current interaction with television distinguishes the lived experiences of today from those of the past the book also shows how the entertainment function of television often masks its ideological purpose particularly its role in reflecting and reproducing america s racial order a useful supplement in

any number of courses on race and society channeling blackness is an ideal text for advanced undergraduate and graduate courses on race and media media and society television studies television criticism communication studies and african american and ethnic studies

speaking of people ebony jet and contemporary art explores the ways contemporary artists use ebony and jet as a resource and as inspiration in their practices published by johnson publishing company for over sixty years both magazines are cultural touchstones for many african americans and often represent a commonality between people of diverse backgrounds considering ebony and jet from a variety of perspectives as journalistic material and important documenters of black life as metaphor for african american culture and as theoretical spaces for black thought and exchange the exhibition examines the magazines material and cultural legacy as artists perceive them while much of the work in the exhibition utilizes ebony and jet imagery and text as source material for some the concept of these iconic publications and their institutional histories provides the starting point for artistic production as popular widely circulated print publications the magazines ushered in a particular phenomenon of collection and display in black domestic spaces somewhat analogously many of the artists included in speaking of people maintain their own personal archives of these iconic publications the first exhibition devoted to this topic speaking of people features over thirty works by a multi generational interdisciplinary group of sixteen artists speaking of people includes photography painting sculpture and sound works that will occupy the museum s main galleries and project space artists in the exhibition include noel anderson jeremy okai davis godfried donkor ellen gallagher theaster gates lyle ashton harris david hartt leslie hewitt glenn ligon kerry james marshall ayanah moor lorna simpson martine syms hank willis thomas mickalene thomas and purvis young accompanying the exhibition will be a fully illustrated exhibition catalogue with essays by assistant curator lauren haynes scholars siobhan carter david romi crawford and elizabeth alexander artist hank willis thomas as well as a foreword by studio museum director and chief curator thelma golden the publication is designed by the original champions of design new york

a collection of writings from the 90s by the popular black feminist scholar and journalist on film art and politics

this is a wide ranging and stimulating introduction to the history and theory of visual culture from painting to the television screen mirzoeff argues that the visual is replacing the linguistic as our primary means of communicating

when life magazine asked gordon parks to illustrate a recurring series of articles on crime in the united states in 1957 he had already been a staff photographer for nearly a decade the first african american to hold this position parks embarked on a six week journey that took him and a reporter to the streets of new york chicago san francisco and los angeles unlike much of his prior work the images made were in color the resulting eight page photo essay the atmosphere of crime was noteworthy not only for its bold aesthetic sophistication but also for how it challenged stereotypes about criminality then pervasive in the mainstream media they provided a richly hued cinematic portrayal of a largely hidden world that of violence police work and incarceration seen with empathy and candor parks rejected clichés of delinquency drug use and corruption opting for a more nuanced view that reflected the social and economic factors tied to criminal behavior and a rare window into the working lives of those charged with preventing and prosecuting it transcending the romanticism of the gangster film the suspense of the crime caper and the racially biased depictions of criminality then prevalent in american popular culture parks coaxed his camera to do what it does best record reality so vividly and compellingly that it would allow life s readers to see the complexity of these chronically oversimplified situations the atmosphere of crime 1957 includes an expansive selection of never before published photographs from parks original reportage my assignment explore crime across america a journey through hell the year was 1957 i rode with detectives through shadowy districts climbed fire escapes broke through windows and doors with them brutality was rampant violent death showed up from dawn to dawn gordon parks co published

after the black is beautiful movement of the 1960s black body politics have been overdetermined by both the familiar fetishism of light skin as well as the counter fetishism of dark skin moving beyond the longstanding focus on the tragic mulatta and making room for the study of the fetishism of both light skinned and dark skinned blackness margo natalie crawford analyzes depictions of colorism in the work of gertrude stein wallace thurman william faulkner black arts poets james baldwin toni morrison and john edgar wideman in dilution anxiety and the black phallus crawford adds images of skin color dilution as a type of castration to the field of race and psychoanalysis an undercurrent of light skinned blackness as a type of castration emerges within an ongoing story about the feminizing of light skin and the masculinizing of dark skin crawford confronts the web of beautified and eroticized brands and scars created by colorism crisscrossing race gender and sexuality the depiction of the horror of these aestheticized brands and scars begins in the white authored and black authored modernist literature examined in the first chapters a call for the end of the ongoing branding emerges with sheer force in the post black movement novels examined in the final chapters

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
