plays film television comedy live comedy and comedy on social media it argues that the period covered was marked by an explosion of comic forms and a flowering of comic creativity across a range of media from the communal watching of silent films at the start of the period to the use of twitter and other online platforms to share and comment on comedy technology has brought about significant changes in its form consumption and social effects as comic forms have shifted and developed so too have attitudes to what comedy can and cannot do this study considers its role in entertainment and in provoking consideration of a range of social and political topics each chapter takes a different theme as its focus form theory praxis identities the body politics and power laughter and ethics these eight different approaches to comedy add up to an extensive synoptic coverage of the subject

comedies were among the first films ever made and comedy played a critical and often overlooked role in the early development of cinema this original book holistically examines the political and sociological dimensions of silent comedy films and the motion picture industry at the turn of the 20th century richard waterman takes a unique social science approach to the cinematic ecosystem and its development during this era studying the wider context the interconnected social political economic and technological movements and forces that shaped film production distribution and consumption in this pivotal period in the history of film and culture these include moral standards and censorship class racism antisemitism sexism and the global film market additionally the book analyzes specific films in depth to mine their themes social context and impact bridging the humanities and social sciences this is a distinctive and valuable contribution to the study of early cinema

this wide ranging collection consisting of 50 essays by leading international scholars in a variety of fields provides an overview of the reception history of a major literary genre from greco roman antiquity to the present day section i considers how the 5th and 4th century athenian comic poets defined themselves and their plays especially in relation to other major literary forms it then moves on to the roman world and to the reception of greek comedy there in art and literature section ii deals with the european reception of greek and roman comedy in the medieval renaissance and early modern periods and with the european stage tradition of comic theater more generally section iii treats the handling of greco roman comedy in the modern world with attention not just to literary translations and stage productions but to more modern media such as radio and film the collection will be of interest to students of ancient comedy as well as to all those concerned with how literary and theatrical traditions are passed on from one time and place to another and adapted to meet local conditions and concerns

this book explores female authorship in uk television comedy with a focus on british and northern irish writers performers more specifically it examines comedy texts produced between 2010 and 2020 a period marked by a proliferation of female centric and female created comedy in the following order comedians julia davis phoebe waller bridge caitlin caroline moran michaela coel and sharon horgan will be analysed as key case studies drawing from these case studies the book has two objectives first it seeks to update kathleen rowe s concept of the unruly

woman shifting the emphasis from visibility and performance to the labour and contexts behind on screen portrayals building on rowe s existing scholarship the book introduces the term fastidious to describe how comedians display delicacy precision and control over their carefully crafted tv series secondly the book aims to extend this concept to british and northern irish tv writers performers who have been either overlooked or examined within broader transnational projects in doing so it reclaims the authorship of women from the uk

the hellenistic age is the link between classical greece and rome originally published in 1964 this book traces the history of hellenistic poetry and art as parallel phenomena it starts in mainland greece with new comedy anyte and aratos and discusses the art of the tanagra figurines and the pella mosaics successive chapters deal with the major figures of alexandrian art down to the end of the second century b c in asia minor except for kos and rhodes already treated with alexandria the art is more significant than the poetry particularly the art of pergamon but antipater of sidon and meleager of gadara are important poets who are treated in some detail the mainland greek story is continued with kleanthes leonidas euphorion and the later mainland poets and with the neo classical style in art which gives place to the archaistic mannerism of the neo attic style at the end of the second century the last chapter deals with poetry and art in italy first with the early hellenistic civilization of sicily and southern italy and then with the successive waves of greek influence on the romans this history of roman poetry down to catullus is viewed from the angle of its indebtedness to greek sources and in conclusion the import of works of art and the later immigration of greek artists is taken into consideration
