the study of the cultural landscape has gained momentum in recent years revealing new insights to geographers archaeologists sociologists and architects the cultural landscape is often viewed as an emblematic site and thus a key player in the heritage process this book explores the overlapping and often complex relationships between identity memory heritage and the cultural landscape it provides an overview of new approaches in the study of these relationships combined with evidence from ireland england scotland and the united states these case studies demonstrate the significance of the past in the contemporary construction of identity narratives and draw attention to the powerful role of monuments and parades as sites of cultural heritage the focus then shifts to the way in which heritage

has become politicized for various ends demonstrating the changing perception of particular heritage sites and buildings and the role that this has played in constructing and reconstructing particular identities

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eighteenth century gentleman scholars collected antiquities nineteenth century nation states built museums to preserve their historical monuments in the present world heritage is a global concern as well as an issue of identity politics what does it mean when runic stones or medieval churches are transformed from antiquities to monuments to heritage sites this book argues that the transformations concern more than words alone they reflect fundamental changes in the way we experience the past and the way historical objects are

assigned meaning and value in the present this book presents a series of cases from norwegian culture to explore how historical objects and sites have changed in meaning over time it contributes to the contemporary debates over collective memory and cultural heritage as well to our knowledge about early modern antiquarianism

memorylands is an original and fascinating investigation of the nature of heritage memory and understandings of the past in europe today it looks at how europe has become a memoryland littered with material reminders of the past such as museums heritage sites and memorials and at how this memory phenomenon is related to the changing nature of identities especially european national and cosmopolitan in doing so it provides new insights into how memory and the past are being performed and reconfigured in europe and with what effects drawing especially though not exclusively on cases concepts and arguments from social and cultural anthropology memorylands argues for a deeper and more nuanced understanding of the cultural assumptions involved in relating to the past it theorizes the various ways in which materializations of identity work and relates these to different forms of identification within europe the book also addresses questions of methodology including discussion of historical ethnographic interdisciplinary and innovative methods through a wide range of case studies from across europe sharon macdonald argues that europe is home to a much greater range of ways of making the past present than is usually realized and a greater range of forms of historical consciousness at the same time however she seeks to highlight what she calls the european memory complex a repertoire of prevalent patterns in forms of recollection and past presencing the examples in memorylands are drawn from both the margins and metropolitan centres from the relatively small scale and local the national and the avant garde the book looks at pasts that are potentially identity disrupting or difficult as well as those that affirm identities or offer possibilities for transcending national identities or articulating more cosmopolitan futures topics covered include authenticity temporalities embodiment commodification nostalgia and ostalgie the musealization of everyday and folk life holocaust commemoration and tourism narratives of war the heritage of islam transnationalism and the future of the past memorylands is engaginally written and accessible to general readers as well as offering a new synthesis for advanced researchers in memory and heritage studies it is essential reading for those interested in identities memory material culture europe tourism and heritage

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based on a transnational study of decommissioned postcolonial prisons in taiwan taipei and chiavi south korea seoul and china lushun this book offers a critical reading of prisons as a particular colonial product the current restoration of which as national heritage is closely related to the evolving conceptualization of punishment focusing on the colonial prisons built by the japanese empire in the first half of the twentieth century it illuminates how punishment has been considered a subject of modernization while the contemporary use of prisons as heritage tends to reduce the process of colonial modernity to oppression and atrocity thus constituting a heritage of shame and death which postcolonial societies blame upon the former colonizers a study of how the remembering of punishment and imprisonment reflects the attempts of postcolonial cities to re articulate an understanding of the present by correcting the past heritage memory and punishment examines how prisons were designed built partially demolished preserved and redeveloped across political regimes demonstrating the ways in which the selective use of prisons as heritage reframed through nationalism leaves marks on urban contexts that remain long after the prisons themselves are decommissioned as such it will appeal to scholars of sociology geography the built environment and heritage with interests in memory studies and dark tourism

there is a vast body of international and national law that regulates cultural heritage however the current regulation remains guite blind to the so called transnational heritage this is heritage where there is no community recognized in law that it can be directly attributed to and that can be responsible for its safekeeping and preservation it can also be items of heritage where the claim of ownership is disputed between two or more peoples or communities transnational heritage challenges the idea of monolithic mono cultural ethno national states there are a number of examples of such cultural heritage for instance the buddhist bamiyan statutes in afghanistan palmyra in syria the jewish heritage of irag or various items that are currently housed in large often western museums as a result of colonial practices this book explores the regulation of transnational heritage by discussing many cases of transnational heritage and the problems that arise due to the lack of regulation the book analyses the manifestations of memories and constructions of communities through heritage it focuses particularly on the concept of community how are communities constructed in cultural heritage law and what falls outside of the definitions of community the book underlines that the issues surrounding transnational heritage involve more than a communal right to culture it is argued that transnational heritage also directly affects wider matters of law such as citizenship human rights sovereignty as well as the movement of people and cultural goods

the examination of social memory and heritage tourism has grown considerably over the past few decades as scholars have critically re examined the relationships between past memories and present actions at international national and local scales methodological innovation and reflection have accompanied theoretical advances as researchers strive to understand representations experiences thoughts emotions and identities of the various actors involved in the reproduction of social memory and heritage landscapes social memory and heritage tourism methodologies describes and demonstrates innovations including qualitative quantitative and mixed method approaches for analysing the process and politics of remembering and touring the past through place an introductory chapter

looks at the history of social memory and heritage tourism research and the particular challenges posed by these fields of study in subsequent chapters the reader is lead through the varying methodologies employed by presenting them in the context of an in depth case study from range of geographical locations the resulting volume showcases innovative research in social memory and heritage tourism and provides the reader with insights into how they can successfully conduct their own research while avoiding common pitfalls this title will be useful reading for scholars professionals and students in tourism geography anthropology and museum studies who are preparing to conduct research on the reproduction of social memory in particular landscapes and places or are interested in investigating heritage tourism practices and representations
