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describes with plenty of colour how surrealism from rene magritte s bowler hats to salvador dali s watches was born and developed the times uk as she did for the modernists in montmartre noted art historian and biographer sue roe now tells the story of the surrealists in montparnasse in montparnasse begins on the eve of the first world war and ends with the 1936 unveiling of dali s lobster telephone as those extraordinary years unfolded the surrealists found ever more innovative ways of exploring the interior life and asking new questions about how to define art in montparnasse recounts how this artistic revolution came to be amidst the salons and cafés of that vibrant neighborhood sue roe is both an incisive art critic of these pieces and a beguiling biographer with a fingertip feel for this compelling world beginning with duchamp roe then takes us through the rise of the dada movement the birth of surrealist photography with man ray the creation of key works by ernst cocteau and others through the arrival of dali on canvas and in their readymades and other works these artists juxtaposed objects never before seen together to make the viewer marvel at the ordinary and at the workings of the subconscious we see both how this art came to be and how the artists of montparnasse lived roe puts us with gertrude stein in her box seat at the opening of the rite of spring with duchamp as he installs his famous urinal at a cocteau theatrical with picasso and coco chanel with breton at a session with freud and with man ray as he romances kiki de montparnasse stein said it best when she noted that the surrealists still saw in the common ways of the 19th century but they complicated things with the bold new vision of the 20th their words mark an enormously important watershed in the history of art and they forever changed the way we all

see the world

when we think of installation art we imagine enormous perhaps bewildering multi media environments in this book mark rosenthal offers an historical interpretation and concise critical analyses that should help deepen readers appreciation of this often confusing medium

this is an examination of the work of marcel duchamp and of the important place that it has in the foundations of 20th century art and culture

situating duchamp firmly within the literature philosophy of his time herbert molderings recaptures the spirit of a frequently misread artist his aesthetic of chance

david hopkins analyses the extensive network of shared concerns and images in the work of marcel duchamp and max ernst the greatest names associated with dada and surrealist art this book covers a broad period from c 1912 to the mid 1940s during which the emergence of dada and surrealism in europe and the united states challenged earlier movements such as cubism and expressionism creating scope for the expression of the unconscious fears and desires of artists acutely sensitive to the troubled nature of their times examining duchamp s and ernst s subversion and manipulation of religious and hermetic beliefs such as catholicism rosicrucianism and masonry david hopkins demonstrates the ways in which these esoteric concerns intersect with themes of peculiarly contemporary relevance including the social construction of gender and notions of ordering and taxonomy this detailed comparison of components of duchamp s and ernst s work reveals fascinating structural patterns enabling the reader to discover an entirely new way of understanding the mechanisms underlying dada and surrealist iconography

replication and originality are central concepts in the artistic oeuvres of marcel duchamp and man ray remaking the readymade reveals the underlying and previously unexplored processes and rationales for the collaboration between duchamp man ray and arturo schwarz on the replication of readymades and objects the 1964 editioned replicas of the readymades sent shock waves through the art world even though the replicas undermined ideas of authorship and problematized the notion of identity and the artist they paradoxically shared in the aura of the originals becoming stand ins for the readymades scholar poet dealer arturo schwarz played a crucial role opening the door to joint or alternate authorship an outstanding relationship between artist and dealer by unearthing previously unpublished correspondence and documentary materials and combining this material with newly conducted exclusive interviews with key participants remaking the readymade details heretofore unrevealed aspects of the technical processes involved in the re creation of iconic long lost dada objects launched on the heels of the centenary of duchamp s fountain this new analysis intensifies and complicates our understanding of duchamp and man ray initial conceptions and raises questions about replication and authorship that will stimulate significant debate about the legacy of the artists the continuing significance of their works and the meaning of terms such as creativity originality and value in the formation of art

marcel duchamp s stature in the history of art has grown steadily since the 1950s as several artistic movements have embraced him as their founding father but although his influence is comparable only to picasso s duchamp continues to be relatively unknown outside his narrow circle of followers this book seeks to explain his oeuvre which has been shrouded with mystery duchamp s two great preoccupations were the nature of scientific truth and a feeling for love with its natural limit death his works all speak

of eroticism in a way that pushes the socially acceptable to its outer limits. Juan Antonio Ramirez addresses such questions as the meaning of the artist's ground-breaking ready-mades and his famous installation *Étant donnés*. His passionate essay reproduces all of Duchamp's important works in addition to numerous previously unpublished visual sources. *Duchamp: Love and Death* even is a seminal monograph for understanding this crucial figure of modern art.

An audience of artists turns this time line for the postwar New York art world on its head, presenting a new pedigree for these artistic movements. Drawing on an array of previously unpublished material, Catherine Craft reveals that Neo-Dada far from being a reaction to abstract expressionism actually originated at the heart of that movement. She concerns about viewers' originality and artists' debts to the past, and one another. Furthermore, she argues the original Dada movement was not incompatible with abstract expressionism. In fact, Dada provided a vital historical reference for artists and critics seeking to come to terms with the radical departure from tradition that abstract expressionism seemed to represent. Tracing the activities of artists such as Robert Motherwell, Barnett Newman, and Jackson Pollock alongside Marcel Duchamp's renewed embrace of Dada in the late 1940s, Craft explores the challenges facing artists trying to work in the wake of a destructive world war and the paintings, objects, writings, and installations that resulted from their efforts. the art of mechanical reproduction presents a striking new approach to how traditional art mediums painting sculpture and drawing changed in the twentieth century in response to photography film and other technologies countering the modernist view that the medium provides advanced art with resistance against technological pressures tamara trodd argues that we should view art and its practices as imaginatively responding to the potential that artists glimpsed in mechanical reproduction putting art into dialogue with the commercial cultures of its time the art of mechanical reproduction weaves a rich history of the experimental networks in which artists as diverse as paul klee hans bellmer ellsworth kelly robert smithson gerhard richter chris marker and tacita dean have worked and it shows for the first time how extensively technological innovations of the moment have affected their work original and broad ranging the art of mechanical reproduction challenges some of the most respected and entrenched criticism of the past several decades and allows us to think about these artists anew

transit transitional transition dalia judovitz catches marcel duchamp on the run with his art in a suitcase and his thought all boxed and ready to go she demonstrates how the theme of transition reappearing from work to work makes each piece reproduce some other piece while all continue to exemplify an original which can no longer be found and which has no creator jean françois lyotard

acknowledged as the artist of the century marcel duchamp 1887 1968 left a legacy that dominates the art world to this day inventing the ironically *dégage* attitude of ready made art making duchamp heralded the postmodern era and replaced pablo picasso as the role model for avant garde artists john f moffitt challenges commonly accepted interpretations of duchamp s art and persona by showing that his mature art after 1910 is largely drawn from the influence of the occult traditions moffitt demonstrates that the key to understanding the cryptic meaning of duchamp s diverse artworks and writings is alchemy the most pictorial of all the occult philosophies and sciences

a new understanding of marcel duchamp and his significance as an artist through an investigation of his non art activities archiving art dealing and most persistently curating this groundbreaking and richly illustrated book tells a new story of the twentieth century s most influential artist recounted not so much through his artwork as through his non art work marcel duchamp is largely understood in critical and popular discourse in terms of the objects he produced whether readymade or meticulously fabricated elena filipovic asks us instead to understand duchamp s art through activities not normally seen as artistic from exhibition making and art dealing to administrating and publicizing these were no occasional pursuits filipovic argues that for duchamp these fugitive tasks were a veritable lifework drawing on many rarely seen images filipovic traces a variety of practices and projects undertaken by duchamp from 1913 to 1969 from his invention of the readymade to the release of his last posthumous work she examines duchamp s note writing archiving and quasi photographic activities which resulted in the box of 1914 and the green box his art dealing marketing and curating that culminated in experimental exhibitions for the surrealists and his miniature museum the *boîte en valise* and his administrative efforts and clandestine maneuvering in order to posthumously embed his *Étant donnés* into a museum demonstrating how those activities reflect the artist s questioning of reproduction and originality as well as photography and the exhibition filipovic proposes that duchamp s non art labor and in particular his curatorial strategies more than merely accompanied his more famous artworks in a certain sense they made them through duchamp s elusive but vital activities he revised the idea of what a modern artist could be with this fascinating book filipovic in turn revises the very idea of duchamp

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
