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the exhibition masquerade representation and the self in contemporary art at the museum of contemporary art in sydney is intended to complement the self portrait exhibition at the art gallery of new south wales although it might be more correct to say that it contrasts with the latter exhibition the contrast is immediately signalled by the title self portrait is bifurcated into representation and the self and the possibility of these two terms uniting is put even further into doubt by masquerade a term which foregrounds dissimulation and disguise in short the approach of the exhibition can be described as subscribing to typical postmodern scepticism about identity that is identity is presented as at the very least unknowable at most illusory and certainly something falsely presumed to be fixed coherent stable or the clear origin point of the subject's actions this is succinctly summarised by the curator of the exhibition rachel kent she notes that much of the work in the show suggests that identity is inherently unstable or subject to change and revision changeability and instability are in turn linked to a questioning of the very concept of identity kent continues in some works a central core of identity is challenged or negated altogether and substituted instead by endless simulacra rather like a hall of mirrors that reflect repeatedly back at one another by susan best

this volume focuses on constitutional ratification the procedure in which a draft constitution is submitted by its creators to the people or their representatives in an up or down vote determining implementation ratification is increasingly common and routinely recommended by experts nonetheless it is neither neutral nor inevitable constitutions can be made without it and when it is used it has significant effects this raises the central question of the book should ratification be recommended put another way is there a reason for treating the procedure as a default for the constitution making process surprisingly these questions are rarely asked the procedure's worth is assumed not demonstrated while ratification is generally overlooked in the literature in fact this is the first sustained study of ratification to address these oversights this book defines ratification and its types explains the procedure's effects conceptual origins and history and then concentrates on finding reasons for its use specifically it builds up and analyzes the three most likely normative justifications these urge the implementation of ratification because the procedure enables the constituent power to make its constitution fosters representation during constitution making or helps create a legitimate constitution ultimately these justifications are found wanting leading to the conclusion that ratification lacks a convincing context independent justification thus until new arguments are developed experts should not give recommendations for ratification as a matter of course practitioners should not reach for it uncritically and more generally one should avoid the blanket application of concepts from democratic theory to extraordinary contexts such as constitution making

master's thesis from the year 2008 in the subject art sculpture plastics grade distinction the open university department of art history language english abstract this research project wants to assess to what extent louise bourgeois is employing surrealist practices in her work another question is in what way bourgeois criticized the practices of historical surrealism and how she has developed these practices further in order to adapt them to new subject matter for instance feminist themes chapter i tries to elucidate how art historians and art critics since the 1980s referred to surrealism when interpreting bourgeois work it is possible to show that bourgeois used the concept of the surrealist object for her installations however she did this in a way in which the female body is only present by implication the erotic dimension which was of great importance for the surrealists is destroyed by allusions to old age and death bourgeois installations of the 1990s can therefore be considered as a radical and feminist reuse of the surrealist object chapter ii looks at works which imply allusions to the unconscious and psycho analysis like the installations arch of hysteria 1992 3 and precious liquids 1992 here i also take into account bourgeois own comments on her work although artist's comments do not represent a definitive interpretation of a work of art this aspect seems justified as bourgeois claims that her art is the result of her direct access to her unconscious at least according to freud this direct access is impossible the unconscious being something impenetrable which communicates with the conscious only by signs however in her installations bourgeois consistently makes allusions to the erotic and desire but she also shows their reverse side fear pain violence voyeurism ephemerality and the ambiguities of male and female identity chapter iii looks at the overall social context of the 1960s and 1970s to which
