tense future falls into two parts the first develops a critical account of total war discourse and addresses the resistant potential of acts including acts of writing before a future that looks barred or predetermined by war part two shifts the focus to long interwar narratives that pit both their scale and their formal turbulence against total war's portrait of the social totality producing both ripostes and alternatives to that portrait in the practice of literary encyclopedism the book's introduction grounds both parts in the claim that industrialized warfare particularly the aerial bombing of cities intensifies an under-examined form of collective traumatization a pretraumatic syndrome in which the anticipation of future conditional violence induces psychic wounds situating this claim in relation to other scholarship on critical futurities saint amour discusses its ramifications for trauma studies historical narratives generally and the historiography of the interwar period in particular the introduction ends with an account of the weak theory of modernism now structuring the field of modernist studies and of weak theory's special suitability for opposing total war that strongest of strong theories

this is a study of modernism sexuality and subjectivity in the work of two leading women modernists each confronted the aspects of her culture and personal history that resulted in a degraded sense of female sexuality and explored how traumatic childhood sexual experiences informed their relationship to female corporeality and fiction writing

virginia woolf was a civilian a noncombatant during the great war unlike the war poet wilfred owen she had not seen god through mud yet although she was remembered by her husband as the least political animal since aristotle invented the definition and called an instinctive pacifist by alex zwerdling her experience and memory of the war became a touchstone against which life itself was measured virginia woolf and the great war focuses on woolf's war consciousness and how her sensitivity to representations of war in the popular press and authorized histories affected both the development of characters in her fiction and her nonfictional and personal writings as the seamless history of the prewar world had been replaced by the realities of modern war woolf herself understood there was no immunity from its ravages even for civilians karen l levenback's readings of mrs dalloway to the lighthouse and the years in particular together with her understanding of civilian immunity the operation of memory in the postwar period and lexical resistance to accurate representations of war are profoundly convincing in securing woolf's position as a war novelist and thinker whose insights and writings anticipate our most current progressive theories on war's social effects and continuing presence

this volume traces ways in which time is represented in reverse forms throughout modernist culture from the beginning of the twentieth century until the decade after world war ii though modernism is often associated with revolutionary or futurist directions this book argues instead that a retrograde dimension is embedded within it by juxtaposing the literature of europe and north america with that of australia and new zealand it suggests how this antipodean context serves to defamiliarize and reconceptualize normative modernist understandings of temporal progression backgazing thus moves beyond the treatment of a specific geographical periphery as another margin on the expanding field of new modernist studies instead it offers

a systematic investigation of the transformative effect of retrograde dimensions on our understanding of canonical modernist texts the title *backgazing* is taken from australian poet robert g fitzgerald s 1938 poem essay on memory and it epitomizes how the cultural history of modernism can be restructured according to a radically different discursive map *backgazing* intellectually reconfigures us and european modernism within a planetary orbit in which the literature of australia and the southern hemisphere far from being merely an annexed margin can be seen substantively to change the directional compass of modernism more generally by reading canonical modernists such as james joyce and t s eliot alongside marginalized writers such as nancy cunard and others and relatively neglected authors from australia and new zealand this book offers a revisionist cultural history of modernist time one framed by a recognition of how its measurement is modulated across geographical space

a handbook on woolf s achievements as an innovative novelist and pioneering feminist theorist it studies her life her works her relationships with other writers her professional career and themes in her work including among others feminism sexuality education and class
