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few critical studies have examined the african american slave narratives that were written in arabic and none of these has seized the occasion to reconsider the problems of

translation and canon formation the relationship between literacy and reason and the relation of western enlightenment reason to arabic texts ronald a t judy offers an alternative interpretation of literacy that challenges the claim of traditional enlightenment discourse that literacy and reason are the privileged properties of western culture judy argues on the basis of his readings of autobiographical african american arabic slave narratives that through the production of the arabic text the african slave already had the necessary element that the west attributes to reason before his original introduction to western culture a literacy that already mediated between africa and europe paying careful attention to the problems of translation and canon formation the book sets out to demonstrate how cultural values the humanities and western figures of reason must be transformed and in particular how national literary traditions must be reconstituted and globalized in the light of current events it includes the first published translation of the longest arabic language slave narrative known to exist in north america which is said to be an autobiographical 19th century arabic slave narrative known as ben ali s diary

given the rise of new interdisciplinary and methodological approaches to african american and black atlantic studies the oxford handbook of the african american slave narrative will offer a fresh wide ranging assessment of this major american literary genre the volume will begin with articles that consider the fundamental concerns of gender sexuality community and the christian ethos of suffering and redemption that are central to any understanding of slave narratives the chapters that follow will interrogate the various agendas behind the production of both pre and post emancipation narratives and take up the various interpretive problems they pose strategic omissions and veiled gestures were often necessary in these life accounts as they revealed disturbing too painful truths far beyond what white audiences were prepared to hear while touching upon the familiar canonical autobiographies of frederick douglass and harriet jacobs the handbook will pay more attention to the under studied narratives of josiah henson sojourner truth william grimes henry box brown and other often overlooked accounts in addition to the literary autobiographies of bondage the volume will anatomize the powerful wpa recordings of interviews with former slaves during the late 1930s with essays on the genre s imaginative afterlife its final essays will chart the emergence and development of neoslave narratives most notably in styron s the confessions of nat turner toni morrison s beloved and octavia butler s provocative science fiction novel kindred in short the handbook will provide a long overdue assessment of the state of the genre and the vital scholarship that continues to grow around it work that is offering some of the most provocative analysis emerging out of the literary studies discipline as a whole

these autobiographies of afro american ex slaves comprise the largest body of literature produced by slaves in human history the book consists of three sections selected reviews of slave narratives dating from 1750 to 1861 essays examining how such narratives serve

as historical material and essays exploring the narratives as literary artifacts

six narrations by slave women about their lives during and after their years in bondage honoring the nobility and strength of african american women of that era

the oxford handbook of the african american slave narrative approaches the history of slave testimony in three ways by prioritizing the broad tradition over individual authors by representing interdisciplinary approaches to slave narratives and by highlighting emerging scholarship on slave narratives concerning both established debates over concerns of authorship and agency for example and developing concerns like ecocritical readings of slave narratives ultimately the aim of the handbook is not to highlight the singularity of any particular account nor to comfortably locate slave narratives in traditional literary or cultural history but rather to faithfully represent a body of writing and testimony that was designed to speak for the many to represent the unspeakable and to account for the experience of enslaved and nominally free communities

african american slave narratives of the 19th century recorded the atrocities of the antebellum south and provided a solid foundation for the african american literary tradition by presenting 16 slave narratives in their entirety this reference conveniently documents this historically significant literary genre a vivid and moving history of african americans seeking to establish community liberty economic independence and education within the constraints of a repressive society this reference intentionally avoids well known narratives and instead collects unavailable and otherwise difficult to find texts to add to the value of the work for researchers and general readers alike each narrative is accompanied by a preface explanatory notes and suggestions for further reading many of the narratives gathered here were influential when initially published josiah henson s presentation of himself for example embodies many of the characteristics given to uncle tom by harriet beecher stowe in her novel uncle tom s cabin while other collections often only provide excerpts from widely available texts this reference includes complete narratives the introductions and annotations redefine current thinking

in the field by closely examining how these authors used language structured their writing and crafted their autobiographies by examining the historical cultural literary and social issues that african americans have faced since their arrival this reference provides the broad context necessary to understand the literary social and intellectual traditions from which these writings developed

it is impossible to understand america without understanding the history of african americans in nearly seven hundred entries the encyclopedia of african american history 1619 1895 documents the full range of the african american experience during that period from the arrival of the first slave ship to the death of frederick douglass and shows how all aspects of american culture history and national identity have been profoundly influenced by the experience of african americans the encyclopedia covers an extraordinary range of subjects major topics such as abolitionism black nationalism the civil war the dred scott case reconstruction slave rebellions and insurrections the underground railroad and voting rights are given the in depth treatment one would expect but the encyclopedia also contains hundreds of fascinating entries on less obvious subjects such as the african grove theatre black seafarers buffalo soldiers the catholic church and african americans cemeteries and burials gender midwifery new york african free schools oratory and verbal arts religion and slavery the secret six and much more in addition the encyclopedia offers brief biographies of important african americans as well as white americans who have played a significant role in african american history from crispus attucks john brown and henry ward beecher to olaudah equiano frederick douglass sarah grimke sojourner truth nat turner phillis wheatley and many others all of the encyclopedia s alphabetically arranged entries are accessibly written and free of jargon and technical terms to facilitate ease of use many composite entries gather similar topics under one headword the entry for slave narratives for example includes three subentries the slave narrative in america from the colonial period to the civil war interpreting slave narratives and african and british slave narratives a headnote detailing the various subentries introduces each composite entry selective bibliographies and cross references appear at the end of each article to direct readers to related articles within the encyclopedia and to primary sources and scholarly works beyond it a topical outline chronology of major events nearly 300 black and white illustrations and comprehensive index further enhance the work s usefulness

between 1937 and 1940 fieldworkers in the works progress administration s federal writers project interviewed around 3 500 formerly enslaved people in north america resulting in roughly 20 000 pages of still unedited and inadequately indexed typescript these accounts the wpa ex slave narratives are the most substantial collection by far of folklore and oral history gathered directly from enslaved people in america it is arguably the single greatest body of african american folklore extant and a significant portion is

devoted to folk music and song this book considers this treasure trove in all its relevant social cultural and historical contexts nineteenth century black folk music developed against the backdrop of north american slavery the american civil war emancipation the federal occupation of the south and a successful white supremacist paramilitary and political insurgency that led to federal withdrawal officially sanctioned racial terror and southern apartheid the wpa ex slave narratives describe that history in remarkable detail despite their inestimable value most of the ex slave narratives remained unpublished until the late 1970s being almost unknown except to folklorists even after publication the collection s sheer size was a barrier quoting extensively from the narratives and exhaustively annotated and indexed this volume provides readers with detailed explanations and full references for every musical item or tradition featured in the ex slave narratives john minton covers instrumental music and social dancing spirituals and hymns singing games and lullabies ring plays and reels worksongs minstrel songs ballads war songs slavery laments and much much more written for both specialists and general readers with 134 illustrations the book also offers a general overview of the ex slave narratives their contents creation and relation to the field of african american folklore as a whole

in one volume there are seven slave narratives compelling harrowing at times and beautiful stories of hope in the midst of deep adversity 1 narrative of the life of frederick douglass an american slave frederick douglass s eloquently written first autobiography was one of the most persuasive forces for emancipation as well as for the enlistment of black soldiers in the union army it is written beautifully and the story flies past a dazzling and awful account of slavery 2 my bondage and my freedom this is frederick douglass s second autobiography written ten years after his emancipation and is unparalleled in its scope of the destructive effects of slavery on both individuals and communities the power of this book is that it delves into the minds of rational good people who were slave owners and discusses the economic conditions that sanctioned slavery s continued existence 3 twelve years a slave this narrative was written by

solomon northrup a freeman kidnapped from the north and taken to a work on a plantation in louisiana where he lived for 12 years until he was rescued violence sadness grief and the treatment of human beings as lower than animals are the themes that run through this famous autobiography 4 the interesting narrative of the life of olaudah equiano or gustavus vassa the african olaudah equiano s interesting story provides an insight into a time and situation that few people survived to record or recall and those that did survive were rarely literate for this reason and so many others equiano or gustavus vassa as he was later christened has a unique story to tell it is an honest and chilling account of a man born free in africa and sold into slavery who spends most of life on the high seas until he finally acquires freedom he relates the experiences of black people in its myriad forms on three continents 5 incidents in the life of a slave girl seven years concealed in the pre civil war period of 1861 harriet jacobs was the only black woman in the united states to have authored her own slave narrative in a call to arouse the women of the north to a realizing sense of the condition of two millions of women at the south to convince the people of the free states what slavery really is jacobs hoped that should the white women of the north know the true conditions of the slave women of the south they would not fail to answer the call to moral action with the help of a northern abolitionist jacobs published this astounding poignant record under the pseudonym linda brent 6 up from slavery an autobiography booker t washington writes his story modestly but his greatness shines through he spent his early childhood as a slave on a plantation in the south but after the emancipation proclamation was read from the porch steps of the big house his ambitions to gain an education and make something of himself propelled him through every obstacle to his goal booker t washington was a tireless promoter of education for his race and founded a school for blacks in alabama he made great strides in elevating the sights and prospects of his people 7 running a thousand miles for freedom this is a great story of a married couple who were slaves and escaped to freedom in a unique way it is a horrifying account of the evil of slavery and the hope of freedom and human rights a compelling read

this genre an exciting and too little known part of american literature and history has played an important role in the development of such distinguished authors as richard wright james baldwin and ralph ellison

the slave experience was a defining one in american history and not surprisingly has been a significant and powerful trope in african american literature in re forming the past a timothy spaulding examines contemporary revisions of slave narratives that use elements of the fantastic to redefine the historical and literary constructions of american slavery in their rejection of mimetic representation and traditional historiography postmodern slave narratives such as ishmael reed s flight to canada octavia butler s kindred toni morrison s beloved charles johnson s ox herding tale and middle passage

jewelle gomez's *The Gilda Stories* and samuel delaney's *Stars in My Pocket Like Grains of Sand* set out to counter the usual slave narrative's reliance on realism and objectivity by creating alternative histories based on subjective fantastic and non-realistic representations of slavery as these texts critique traditional conceptions of history identity and aesthetic form they simultaneously re-invest these concepts with a political agency that harkens back to the original project of the 19th century slave narratives in their rejection of mimetic representation and traditional historiography spaulding contextualizes postmodern slave narrative by addressing both literary and popular african american texts re-forming the past expands discussions of both the african american literary tradition and postmodern culture

though america experienced an increase in a native born population and an emerging african american identity throughout the nineteenth century african culture did not necessarily dissipate with each passing decade archer examines the slave narratives of four key members of the abolitionist movement frederick douglass william wells brown harriet tubman and harriet jacobs revealing how these highly visible proponents of the antislavery cause were able to creatively engage and at times overcome the cultural biases of their listening and reading audiences when engaged in public sphere discourses these individuals were not as some scholars have suggested inclined to accept unconditionally stereotypical constructions of their own identities rather they were quite skillful in negotiating between their affinity with antislavery christianity and their own intimate involvement with slave circle dance and improvisational song burial rites conjuration divination folk medicinal practices african dialects and african inspired festivals the authors emerge as more complex figures than scholars have imagined their political views though sometimes moderate often reflected a strong desire to strike a fierce blow at the core of the slavocracy

women have had a complex experience in african american culture the first work of its

kind this encyclopedia approaches african american literature from a women s studies perspective while yolanda williams page s encyclopedia of african american women writers provides biographical entries on more than 150 literary figures this book is much broader in scope included are several hundred alphabetically arranged entries on african american women writers as well as on male writers who have treated women in their works entries on genres periods themes characters historical events texts places and other topics are included as well each entry is written by an expert contributor and relates its subject to the overall experience of women in african american literature entries cite works for further reading and the encyclopedia closes with a selected general bibliography african american culture is enormously diverse and the experience of women in african american society is especially complex women were among the first african american writers and works by black women writers are popular among students and general readers alike at the same time african american women have been oppressed and texts by black male authors represent women in a variety of ways the first of its kind this encyclopedia approaches african american literature from a women s studies perspective and thus significantly illuminates the african american cultural experience through literary works included are several hundred alphabetically arranged entries written by numerous expert contributors in addition to covering male and female african american authors the encyclopedia also discusses themes major works and characters genres periods historical events places and other topics included are entries on such authors as maya angelou james baldwin frederick douglass nikki giovanni june jordan claude mckay ishmael reed sojourner truth phillis wheatley and many others in addition the many works discussed include beloved blanche on the lam iknow why the caged bird sings the men of brewster place quicksand the street waiting to exhale and many more the many topical entries cover black feminism black nationalism conjuring children s and young adult literature detective fiction epistolary novel motherhood sexuality spirituality stereotypes and many others entries relate their topics to the experience of african american women and cite works for further reading features and benefits includes hundreds of alphabetically arranged entries draws on the work of numerous expert contributors includes a selected general bibliography offers a range of finding aids such as a list of entries a guide to related topics and an extensive index supports the literature curriculum by helping students analyze major writers and works supports the social studies curriculum by helping students use literature to understand the experience of african american women covers the full chronological range of african american literature fosters a respect for cultural diversity develops research skills by directing students to additional sources of information builds bridges between african american history literature and women s studies

the neo slave narrative is an important development in american literary history and has

serious revisionist intentions at its foundation this book examines how contemporary african american women writers have shaped the genre these authors have written neo slave narratives to reinscribe history from the perspective of the african american woman most specifically the nineteenth century enslaved mother the writers considered in this study sherley anne williams toni morrison j california cooper gayl jones and octavia butler explore american slavery through the lens of gender both to interrogate the myth that enslaved women denied the privilege of having a gender identity by the institution of slavery were in fact genderless and to celebrate the acts of resistance which enabled enslaved women to mother in the fullest sense of the term the volume begins with an overview of historical representations of slavery in america from the slave narrative itself to the revisionist scholarship of the 1960s the book then examines several individual neo slave narratives such as margaret walker s jubilee 1966 williams dessa rose 1986 morrison s beloved 1987 cooper s family 1991 jones corregidora 1975 and butler s kindred 1979 what the women in these novels have in common is the fact that they mother what the writers have in common is a tendency to utilize subversive strategies such as reversal blurring and the creation of myth to dramatize gender identity and to highlight the varied nature of motherhood as enslaved women experienced it the final chapter evaluates the influence of the neo slave narrative on american literature in general and on popular perceptions and misperceptions of african american women
