they were queens heretics saints mistresses courtesans rebels and geniuses this book tells world history as you rarely read it through the lives of women who seized power created knowledge defied systems or changed the world often against all odds from hatshepsut and cleopatra to ada lovelace marie curie wangari maathai and greta thunberg from mystics and seers to pirates revolutionaries and computer pioneers some were revered others reviled or forgotten but none were insignificant this is not a list of heroines but a vibrant mosaic of humanity courage ambition and contradiction a book for readers who want not just to know history but to feel it
