my mind god of my inner most will every part of this world is within your power you are within every part of the world every part of me is within your power you are within every part of me is am yours whether i serve you willingly or not for i am myself whether i am true to myself or not of my own free will i now acknowledge your abundant power of my own free will i now present myself to you in your service the wizard speaking the words the words to his master the enemy of the world free to wreak havoc among god s people satan s wizard returns once more the ice cracking crashing to the ground blocks of ice sliding down the church altar steps slowly melting away into the dark cracks and crevices the wizard stretching out his hand a devilish smile comes to his face i am free his eyes red filled with revenge and hate the wizards delight becomes infectious with madness his laughs fill the cavernous church the apostles thought they could stop me pope clement of rome thought he could stop me that ridiculous priest bernard thought he could stop me nothing can stop simon magnus

the wonderful wizard of oz remains one of the world's most beloved and widely read books throughout a century of remarkable change the popularity of I frank baum's classic tale has endured and grown embraced by generation after generation of children and the young at heart to honour the centennial of its publication in 1900 the university press of kansas is presenting this special anniversary edition that combines baum's original text with the contributions of two renowned artists book illustrator michael mccurdy and writer ray bradbury the book embraces and celebrates the oft kidded connection between baum's wondrous story and the state of kansas

since the publication of I frank baum s the wonderful wizard of oz in 1900 authors filmmakers and theatrical producers have been retelling and reinventing this uniquely american fairy tale this volume examines six especially significant incarnations of the story baum s original novel the mgm classic the wizard of oz 1939 sidney lumet s african american film musical the wiz 1978 gregory maguire s novel wicked the life and times of the wicked witch of the west 1995 stephen schwartz and winnie holzman s broadway hit wicked a new musical 2003 and the syfy channel miniseries tin man 2007 a close consideration of these works demonstrates how versions of baum s tale are influenced by and help shape notions of american myth including issues of gender race home and magic and makes clear that the wizard of oz narrative remains compelling and relevant today

this is the first book from the tales about the fairy land of oz the story chronicles the adventures of a young farm girl named dorothy in the magical land of oz after she and her pet dog toto are swept away from their kansas home by a cyclone the novel is one of the best known stories in american literature and has been widely translated

riccard and rowina are on a mission to find their missing father ivan eventually they arrive in the town of weirdsdale near the stove pipe mountains one of these vulcan occasionally emits weird lights during which men caught outside at night disappear suspecting that ivan has been captured by the lights they access vulcan finding it to be the home of foxwald who assures them that ivan is not in vulcan but he allows them to stay and search during foxwald s absence battling the forces of evil they find their father though he does not recognize them returning foxwald is shocked to find that he himself is responsible for their missing father
