the purpose of this text is to introduce students to great philosophy and great philosophers through an intense focus on argument like other topically organized introductory philosophy readers this book is organized around the existence of god knowledge and skepticism mind and body free will and determinism ethics and contemporary ethical debates including abortion euthanasia and global hunger and poverty 78 selections are grouped into six topical chapters and the selections within those chapters are organized by argument vaughn s approach focuses students attention on argumentation where much of the philosophical work gets done

the moral philosopher and novelist iris murdoch said that philosophy is both the guide and mirror of the age in this wide ranging book mark hopwood explores the significance of murdoch s philosophy in the present day paying particular attention to her account of the role of metaphor and imagery in moral reasoning hopwood argues that one of the main reasons murdoch s work has often been neglected by mainstream moral philosophers is that she offered a radically different conception of what it means to do moral philosophy rather than seeking to establish a single systematic moral framework in the manner of utilitarian or kantian theories she argued that moral philosophers ought to be concerned with describing the varied range of moral concepts that we actually use in everyday life and elaborating new concepts and modes of understanding to meet our most pressing social needs examining the role of vision imagination love goodness and transcendence in murdoch s work the moral philosophy of iris murdoch presents a compelling and original argument that she is one of the major moral philosophers of the twentieth century

students can easily remember and apply and that instructors can refer to when reviewing student papers these rules cover essay organization sentence structure documentation styles plagiarism grammar usage and more written in a clear and engaging style and incorporating samples of student writing writing philosophy is an indispensable resource for virtually any philosophy course

in ethics and the autonomy of philosophy bernard walker sets out with two objectives first walker argues that ethics is autonomous as a discipline oftentimes ethics books from a christian perspective lean toward grounding ethics in theology or in biblical proof texting walker departs from this tradition ethics grounded in theology entails a limited scope for those doing ethics in that the christian god must be assumed for both christian and non christian when at the table of ethical dialogue for the non christian this loads the dice and shuts down ethical consensus and dialogue if not ethical truth with that said this book does not depart from christian ethical views on such issues as the sanctity of life antiracism the death penalty the objectivity of ethics and the importance of integrating faith into ethics however walker does so from a common denominator of philosophy rather than theology second walker ventures into the streets and engages the man woman on the streets approach to ethics and ethical decision making he points out the shortcomings of the ubiquitous views of the man woman on the streets viz cultural relativism skepticism and the attitude that ethics is merely a matter of personal choice

this volume represents a significant advance of the philosophical and theological conversation surrounding molinism it opens by arguing that molinism constitutes the best explanation of the scriptural data on divine sovereignty human freedom predestination grace and god s salvific will the alleged biblical prooftexts for open theism are better explained according to kirk macgregor by molinism responding to philosophical critics of molinism macgregor offers a novel solution to the well known grounding objection and a robust critique of

arguments from explanatory priority he also presents a molinist interpretation of branching time models as heuristic illustrations of the relationship between possibility and feasibility seeking to push molinism into new territories macgregor furnishes a molinist account of sacred music according to which music plays a powerful apologetic function finally regarding the nature of hell macgregor contends that molinism is compatible with both eternalism and eventual universalism

the power of critical thinking offers a comprehensive introduction to the systematic rational evaluation of the arguments claims and evidence that lead to beliefs in clear and accessible language the authors take students through all essential components of critical analysis from identifying premises and conclusions to recognizing common fallacies and misrepresentations of fact to using deductive and inductive reasoning to deconstruct arguments to overcoming psychological social and philosophical impediments that can cloud clear thinking emphasizing the importance of critical thinking to personal development and success with expanded field problems and new everyday problems and decisions boxes the power of critical thinking provides students with the skills they need to engage meaningfully with the world around them both inside and outside the classroom

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
