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accessibly written writing systems a linguistic approach provides detailed coverage of all major writing systems of historical or structural significance with thorough discussion of structure history and social context as well as important theoretical issues discusses systems as diverse as chinese greek and maya presents each system in light of four major aspects of writing history and development internal structure the relationship of writing and language and sociolinguistic aspects includes glossary of technical terms extensive illustrations exercises and further reading suggestions to aid in teaching from the book

to say that writing has as much claim as speech to be treated as language may strike the reader as a statement of the obvious but the fact is that although the tide is beginning to turn now for most of the twentieth century linguistics has almost wholly ignored writing it is not necessary to accept all the theories of the french critic jacques derrida in order to agree with him when he describes writing as the wandering outcast of linguistics this book is offered in the belief that written language is a form of language as such it deserves to be treated with the methods of modern scientific linguistic study which have been increasing our understanding of the spoken form of language for many decades

an understanding of language as a complex system helps us to think differently about linguistics and helps us to address the impact of linguistic interaction this book demonstrates how the science of complex systems changes every area of linguistics how to make a grammar how to think about the history of language how language works in the brain and how it works in social settings kretzschmar argues that to construct the best grammars of languages it is necessary to understand the complex system of speech each chapter makes specific recommendations for how linguists should manage empirical data in order to form better generalizations about a language and its varieties the book will be welcomed by students and scholars working in linguistics and english language especially the study of language variation and the historical development of english
