the affinities between pierre hadot's and michel foucault's interpretations of ancient philosophy as well as their impact are well known however these interpretations have been criticized in several crucial points this book provides the first extensive critical assessment of these interpretations it brings together specialists in ancient philosophy as well as hadot and foucault scholars in order both to explore criticisms and clarify hadot's and foucault's accounts in doing so it not only offers an overview of the main trends in philosophy as a way of life but also recasts the debate and opens new paths of inquiry in the field

austinian themes offers a reconstruction of philosophical views on several themes developed by j l austin exploring austin's work in detail through a series of thematically organized chapters marina sbisà draws on both published work as well as unpublished manuscript notes to offer a defence of austin's speech act theory characterized by a specific notion of illocution against some important criticisms sbisà offers a reconstruction of austin's responsibility based conception of action drawing on his remarks on acts and actions in how to do things with words and in later papers exploring austin's contributions to epistemology and the philosophy of perception including his realist stance anti scepticism and presentational view of perception sbisà analyses the roles that he assigns to knowledge in the dynamics of assertion on the theme of truth austin's claims are expounded and explained as worthy of reassessment other chapters explore the ways in which austin deals with sense reference family resemblances truth falsity assessments and context dependence austin's most famous statement of method as outlining a linguistic phenomenology is cast as analogous to husserl's phenomenology in adopting an epoché which isolates language rather than consciousness a reading which helps to clarify several characteristic positions adopted by austin on metaphilosophical themes sbisà analyses the notion of ordinariness distinguishing it from common sense and the endorsement of the linguistic turn approaching it instead in terms of the by default nature of the social bond and conversational cooperation various

recurrent aspects of austin s philosophy are illuminated the opposition to dichotomies the attention paid to intersubjectivity the commitment to a sober philosophy and a strong sense of human situatedness

american women novelists of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries registered a call for a new sexual freedom dale bauer contends by creating a lexicon of sex expression many authors explored sexuality as part of a discourse about women s needs rather than confining it to the realm of sentiments where it had been relegated if broached at all by earlier writers this new rhetoric of sexuality enabled critical conversations about who had sex when in life they had it and how it signified whether liberating or repressive sexuality became a potential force for female agency in these women s novels bauer explains insofar as these novelists seized the power of rhetoric to establish their intellectual authority thus bauer argues they helped transform the traditional ideal of sexual purity into a new goal of sexual pleasure defining in their fiction what intimacy between equals might become analyzing the work of canonical as well as popular writers including edith wharton anzia yeziarska julia peterkin and fannie hurst among others bauer demonstrates that the new sexualization of american culture was both material and rhetorical

ritual has long been a central concept in anthropological theories of religious transmission ritual performance and the senses offers a new understanding of how ritual enables religious representations ideas beliefs values to be shared among participants focusing on the body and the experiential nature of ritual the book brings together insights from three distinct areas of study cognitive neuroanthropology performance studies and the anthropology of the senses eight chapters by scholars from each of these sub disciplines investigate different aspects of embodied religious practice ranging from philosophical discussions of belief to explorations of the biological processes taking place in the brain itself case studies range from miracles and visionary activity in catholic malta to meditative practices in theatrical performance and include three pilgrimage sites the church of the holy sepulchre in jerusalem the festival of ramlila in ramnagar india and the mountain shrine of the lord of the shiny snow in andean peru understanding ritual allows us to understand processes at the very centre of human social life and humanity itself making this an invaluable text for students and scholars in anthropology cognitive science performance studies and religious studies

Austin, once a well-recognized physics professor and researcher at the California Institute of Technology, still harbors the slight hope that there will again come a time when our scientific technology will be applied to real life. Now, while everyone awaits the outcome of the final pole shift, he teaches cutting-edge physics to a small class of students of various ages, the future parents of the root race of humans that will hopefully rebuild society. But Austin is restless; he can't believe what has become of the planet and the humans who once ruled it. He has to know what the future holds. Does the music play forever? Will all life on earth end before the middle of the twenty-first century, thus destroying everything mankind has ever discovered since the beginning of time as we know it, or have we learned from our past mistakes and will we build a future society more in tune with nature?
