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modernity was supposed to be the period in human history when the fears that pervaded social life in the past could be left behind and human beings could at last take control of their lives and tame the uncontrolled forces of the social and natural worlds and yet at the dawn

of the twenty first century we live again in a time of fear whether its the fear of natural disasters the fear of environmental catastrophes or the fear of indiscriminate terrorist attacks we live today in a state of constant anxiety about the dangers that could strike unannounced and at any moment fear is the name we give to our uncertainty in the face of the dangers that characterize our liquid modern age to our ignorance of what the threat is and our incapacity to determine what can and can t be done to counter it this new book by zygmunt bauman one of the foremost social thinkers of our time is an inventory of liquid modern fears it is also an attempt to uncover their common sources to analyse the obstacles that pile up on the road to their discovery and to examine the ways of putting them out of action or rendering them harmless through his brilliant account of the fears and anxieties that weigh on us today bauman alerts us to the scale of the task which we shall have to confront through most of the current century if we wish our fellow humans to emerge at its end feeling more secure and self confident than we feel at its beginning

we are living in times when populism war and climate change are all sources of anxiety caused by overlapping crises anxiety is a phenomenon that is not just reflected everywhere around us but is also increasingly manifesting itself in contemporary drama particularly in the last five to ten years many new british dramas and theatre productions have given a stage to anxiety given this central role of anxiety the aim of this study is to outline the interplay of theatre and anxiety on both a thematic and aesthetic level it argues that a strand of contemporary theatre that combines topics of social ecological technological and pandemic importance with investigations into the philosophical and aesthetic implications of anxiety has come to prominence in recent years the theatre of anxiety this is traced across exemplary readings of a number of contemporary british plays by playwrights such as caryl churchill zinnie harris alistair mcdowall and others they show that contemporary drama and performance both aesthetically and thematically reflect and comment on global crises and catastrophes through the lens of anxiety as a feeling that colours the perception of and reaction to these social and political conditions

the volume offers a timely discussion of the feeling of fear adopting a diachronic and

complex perspective taking into account its various forms including its literary mythological anthropological psychoanalytical etymological philosophical theological and historiographical representations among others it tackles the concept of fear in a range of time periods in cultural and literary history from the archaic period and greco roman classical antiquity to the modern and postmodern periods as such the volume marks an extremely relevant contribution to scholarship in the humanities and will be of interest to scholars professors and students as well as anyone interested in the analysis of profound human feelings

this book examines the insecurity that besets our lives in the contemporary world whether as a result of natural disasters human negligence or more recently threats to security in the form of terrorist activity which itself gives rise to new fears fear of travel agoraphobia distrust of others and existential anxieties revealing the connection between the two components of our insecurity as reflecting on and conditioning human existence and producing social problems the author brings this to bear on the notion of security that modernity had sought to guarantee to its citizens a notion that has slowly crumbled with the crisis of modernity and with the emergence of the liquid world now insecurity is endemic and has so firmly become part of us as to be accepted as an unpleasant aspect of normality that we must live with however the necessity of living in a risk society in which security has emerged as important does nothing to dispel the fear that accompanies us at all times an engagement with the thought of bauman that explores fear as an accompaniment to the end of modernity and its assurances state of fear in a liquid world offers developments of the thesis of liquid modernity and will appeal to scholars and students of sociology social theory and politics with interests in individualisation social change and in security

this book offers a diachronical and inter transmedia approach to the relationship of media and fear in a variety of geographical and cultural settings this allows for an in depth understanding of the media s role in pandemics wars and other crises as well as in political intimidation the book assembles chapters from a variety of authors focusing on the relation between media and fear in the west the middle east the arab world and china besides its

geographical and cultural diversity the volume also takes a long term perspective bringing together cases from transforming media environments which span over a century the book establishes a strong and historically persistent nexus between media and fear which finds ever new forms with new media but always follows similar logics

the need to develop collective skills to acquire a shared long term vision and to manage change is evident given that resources are limited and there is no such thing as complete independence or immunity from the damaging effects of other people s acts or failures to act current trends are having a significant effect on both the scope and the substance of specific responsibilities individual or collective voluntary or statutory in addition extreme interdependence exacerbates the differences between values concepts of well being and interests potentially giving rise to mutually destructive conflicts wastage of resources and externally negative consequences hence the council of europe s proposal to adopt the concept of shared social responsibility as a vital adjunct to specific responsibilities to make them more meaningful in accordance with this concept which is the subject of a charter addressed to governments and to all stakeholders all parties are encouraged to

europe has been going through its most serious crisis of values since the fall of communism in public discourse economic and social pressures have overshadowed the other dimensions of the crisis including societal values however the crisis of values would appear to be more than simply an effect of the recession europeans have lost trust in democratic institutions at all levels european national and local rising xenophobia and discrimination against minorities undermine the vitality of the european model of tolerance europe is plagued by endemic corruption which costs it more than 100 billion euro annually triggering political instability some believe that once europe is back on the path of growth the crisis of values will disappear and that there will be a resurgence of faith in european integration but in the long term growth in western societies may be impaired by serious headwinds resulting from demographic trends and rising inequalities and europe may become the first post growth society european societies are already changing their traditional characteristics as a result of exposure to the effects of two global mega trends the empowerment of the

individual and cosmopolitisation can the european project be of relevance when addressing these challenges what role in this process can be played by the council of europe which is the embodiment of the idea that europe is bigger than the european union and the european agenda is richer than the economy and politics

why are newspapers and television programs filled with stories about crime and criminals is their portrayal of crime accurate how do the media transform our attitudes to crime is fear of crime for example really created by the media the book introduces the different ways in which relationships between crime and the media have been understood including classic debates about the media s effects news production and moral panics as well as more cutting edge studies of the representation of crime in the contemporary media
